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Probably the most far reaching decision in recent years was handed down by the United States Supreme Court Monday, in the case of the Standard Oil Co., when that organization was ordered to be dissolved in six months time. The court held that this company was a monopoly in the restraint of trade and as such had no right of existence. Many other corporations will come under the same ruling and it is the intention of the government to classify all corporations and deal with them according to the merits of their particular cases. This decision will also give the lower courts a reasonable basis to draw their conclusions from, as the Sherman law contained a number of unreasonable provisions which could not be considered by the courts. It is not expected that the decision will have a bad effect upon the business conditions of the country at large.

It is announced that President Taft is very much against the recall of judges in the different courts. Unless a new law is enacted whereby the judges are appointed on knowledge and merit the people will not relinquish the only weapon they possess to rid themselves of a jurist who is unqualified for the position he holds.

It is encouraging to note that the repairing of the damage from fire at the state asylum will not make a deficiency in the funds of that institution as is generally supposed. The State of Oregon carries its own insurance, and the payment will be made by the issuance of certificates bearing 6 per cent and these certificates under the law will be taken up by the next legislature.

The Aurora Womans' Club deserves great credit for the splendid work performed last Saturday in cleaning up the refuse and rubbish that had accumulated about town. With the yards all cleaned up it is now up to property owners themselves or the City Council to remove the unsightly wood piles that are on the streets.

The destruction of the convent at St. Paul will be a severe loss to that town both in a business and social way. It is hardly expected that it will be rebuilt at that point as it is so far from transportation. Several hundred children will have to be transferred to other schools.

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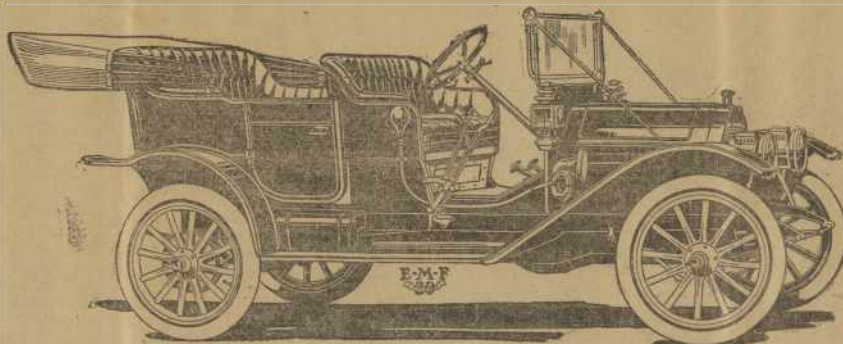
