Admirers of Bobbie Burns, the Scottish poet, will tonight celebrate his anniversary in a thousand American cities and villages. No poet has so touched the human heart as he, and no other Scotchman is held so dear to those of Scottish blood as Bobbie Burns.

W. Al Jones and Ivan G. Martin are evidently making their clerks earn their salaries in writing letters. It's a cold day when these members do not sign a few score of letters to their county constituents, introduce a bill or two, attend a bone-dry banquet, vote a dozen bills into oblivion, dodge a half a hundred lobbyists, and go home to be at a. m. Great is the life of a legislator!

Representative Brownell of Clackamas County, pre-election apostle of economy, has introduced a bill raising the salary of the Clackamas County judge and the County treasurer. This is the same "slick" George Brownell who promised the Clackamas County farmers last summer that he would, within 48 hours after his arrival in Salem, place laws on the statute books reducing salaries, abolishing commissions, firing the "chair warmers," and enforcing the rule of economy all along the line!

During 1916, Marion County automobile owners paid license fees amounting to \$9,278 to the State of Oregon, which expended \$1,665.12 of it for number plates, clerical services, postage, express, printing, stationary, supplies etc. in connection with the collection of the former amount, leaving \$6,612.88 which was this week remitted to the County treasurer of Marion County, for road purposes. Thus it cost 21 per cent of amount collected to get it; or out of each dollar collected the expense of collection was 21 cents.

The Southern Pacific has adopted the plan of building all its wooden freight cars from lumber produced along its lines, the work to be done in its own shops, principally at Sacramento. It plans to build as soon as possible 2000 box cars, 450 stock cars, and 500 flat cars. Another 1000 will be built for the Pacific Fruit Express Co. The latter company has also ordered 1700 more cars in the East. This gives the S. P. 5650 new freight cars for the coming season. This will be a long start towards heading off any car shortage next fall.

The "great light way" of the city will continue to take our best young people from the country, unless farm life is made more interesting, more attractive, more profitable. Life in the city is alluring. Life in the country is wholesome and natural, but the attractions of urban life are magnets that draw the best rural blood away from the wholesome country into the sordid currents of city life. Every educational activity that helps to make farm life more attractive to young people is worth more than it can possibly cost. The work of the industrial clubs for boys and girls is more important to Oregon farmer's families than the work of a dozen game commissions. Yet the legislature has cut out a small \$12,000 for such work while the Game Commission will be allowed to spend \$150,000 in work of questionable value. Educational work along the lines indicated should not be sacrificed. It is false economy and poor politics for our representatives to kill these appropriations.

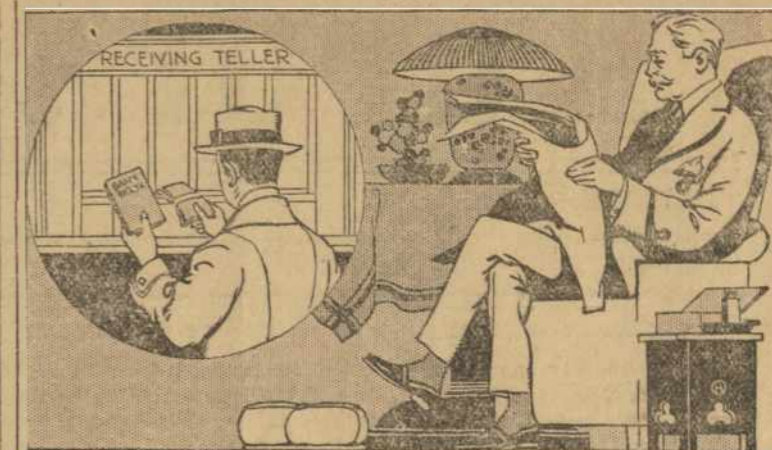
