MACKSBURG.

Already the harvest has commenced, beginning with the fruit. The strawberries have all been disposed of, cherries, raspberries and loganberries are taking their place. Should the later crops be an abundant as is the early fruit, the harvest must, truly, be a bounteous one. That favorite of the thrifty housewife, the wild blackberry is unprecedently plenty. Along the roadside and in the woods their graceful vines are climbing everywhere. Beautiful to the eye while in blossom they are no less so when laden with fruit in the rich crimson of the unripe state, or when, as now, growing black and ripe in the sunshine. The shining black of the ripened fruit thrown into contrast by its foliage of dark green, would alone, be sufficient to charm the passer-by, but interspersed here and there by the wild rose now in full bloom they give a sente of beauty and of luxury that must have been inspiring to travelers like the great French author Chateaubriand who in the 18th century came to America in search of health and of material for his books. Before the railroad, the ocean steamer or the telegraph, exploring the pathless Northwest territory with only an Indian guide, he found here the subject for his novel "Alala" which is read with avidity today by all lovers of scholarly romance. After a three month's voyage in a sail vessel, he must have come in one of the vehicles drawn by oxen from the Atlantic coast. We know not how long was the time spent in this journey but early settlers tell of being six months in coming from the Mississippi to Western Oregon. While here he must have been in ignorance of what was transpiring in his native land, torn then, as it is, today by the ruthless hand of war. We only know that when he returned invigorated by the mountain air, and laden with honor from his literary toil, it was to find himself alone in the world. All of his family having met the doom that befell the nobility in the Revolution of France.
