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JUDGE McCAMMANT COMING

Justice Wallace McCommant, of the state supreme court, will be the principal speaker at a Patriotic mass meeting, Monday evening at 7:30 at the I. O. O. F. hall in this city. Judge McCamant is a forceful speaker, of pleasing personality, scholarly attainments, suave and urbane in manner, and stanch and unwavering in his Americanism.

The speakers will explain many things about the war and war preparations which will prove startling revelations to us. They will show how all Junkerdom is watching the growth of our army, the progress of our plans to build hundreds (even thousands of ships) and tens of thousands of air-ships. They will explain the use of the ten or fifteen billions we are spending this year, the means of raising this staggering sum, the conservation of food, the progress of the Liberty Loan campaign, and lay before the people the burning necessities of the hour. HOP NOTES

It is reported that brewers are afraid that Congress may pass adverse legislation at its December session, hence they are not interested in hops at present prices.

Notwithstanding the sale of the Natoma hops in this state at 40 cents, the California market is no better than

35 cents, and some good hops there have sold at 34 cents.

The only hop deal of importance reported this week is the sale of nearly 500 bales by Frank Natoma at Independence at 40 cents. It is said these hops will be shipped to South Africa. Eastern brewers are hard to interest in Coast hops as they are mostly said to be well supplied with paper hops—hops contracted for future delivery.

MORE ROAD WORK UNDER WAY AGAIN

County commissioner Goulet and roadmaster Culver were here Tuesday on official business connected with the cutting down of the Pacific Highway opposite the Erbsland property. The street will be cut about two feet at the highest point and a fill made in other parts of the street. The highway route has now been definitely fixed through town along First street, to the Bank corner, thence along main street to the J. W. Sadler corner, thence along Fifth street (Bob's Avenue) to the Joseph Erbsland corner, thence south along the original Pacific Highway to the city limits. Corners will be cut off the Sadler and Erbsland properties to give a freer view to motorists rounding those corners.

The state highway commission last Thursday decided to pave 10 miles of the Pacific Highway from Aurora southward, in accordance with the plan of which Chairman Benson had already informed Mayor Sadler of this city.

The paving will begin early next spring, hence the work of grading the city's part of the highway will probably begin at once, as the highway commission require grading done in time to have the road bed well settled before the paving is laid.

YOUR OPPORTUNITY
