DO YOUR PART

The nation-wide movement to save food does not mean that we shall eat less, but to eat more wisely and without waste. We are not asked to stint ourselves or to go without food, but to use substitutes for foods that are needed by our soldiers and those of our allies. We can save wheat and meat, bacon and ham, butter and sugar, by using other foods in their stead. It is no hardship or sacrifice to adopt the Hoover plan of one wheatless meal a day or one meatless day a week, yet its general observance will save millions of pounds of food for the men who are fighting our battles. The war cannot be won on the battle line alone. The struggle to conserve food is one of the chief lines of defense, and every person who wastes food now is giving our enemies aid and comfort. People of this section can render efficient war-time service by using all the home grown products they possibly can, by practicing the "gospel of the clean plate", by cooking no more than is necessary, by using corn or rye bread at least one meal each day, by boiling and baking more, and frying less, by signing the food pledge cards next week and co-operating with the food administration department of the government, and by doing their part and getting others to do like wise.

THERE AND HERE

"Over there" we have boys in khaki. They are in camp and cantonment. They have answered their country's call. But what are we doing "over here"? We may not all serve at the front, but we have the privilege of playing an important part. The firing line is no farther than the nearest bank. There you can buy a Liberty Bond—a shot at the militarism of autocracy, a blow in defense of American rights and larger freedom. Men fight and die for money so invested, will be used to win the war, and your country returns you your money—with 4 per cent. No man can feel that he has properly responded to his impulses of Patriotism unless he contributes, directly or indirectly, personally toward the winning of this war. The Liberty Loan offers the opportunity for such a response.

While our boys in khaki "over there" are sacrificing their all at call of the Nation what are we doing "over here"? While our soldiers are making the supreme sacrifice in France, are you unwilling to let the government pay you 4 per cent on your money invested in the safest securities in the world—Liberty Loan Bonds? Are you?

BOND INFORMATION

Those who have subscribed to the First Liberty Loan and have not yet received their bonds should apply to their banks to have the bonds (or the interim certificates) exchanged for the 4% Conversion Bonds, which are exactly like the original First Liberty Loan Bonds except that they bear 4% instead of 3 1-2%. The Conversion Bonds contain all the tax-free and other privileges of the original bonds, but they bear higher rate of interest.

The exchange of bonds or interim certificates of the first issue for the 4% conversion bonds has nothing to do with subscriptions to the second Liberty Loan, and interim certificates or 3 1-2% bonds of the First Liberty Loan cannot be exchanged for nor given in payment for subscriptions to the second Liberty Loan. The three kinds of bonds mentioned above may be described as follows:

- First Liberty Loan of 1917—15-30 year, 3 1-2 % Gold Bonds. Maturity, June 15, 1947. Rate 3 1-2%. (These will be exchanged for First Liberty Loan of 1917 Conversion Bonds.)
- First Liberty Loan of 1917—4% Conversion Bonds. (not yet issued). Maturity, June 15, 1947. Rate, 4%. (These will replace bonds under (a).)
- Second Liberty Loan of 1917, 10-25 year, 4% Convertible Gold Bonds. Maturity, November 15, 1942. Rate 4%. (Now ready).

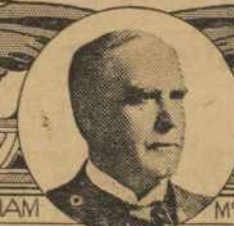
