Gradually the Red Cross work, which at its first mention was by some regarded with disfavor—is growing into approval of the club members. There is always something magnetic about work done for the comfort of the boys away from home, a fascination to which the Red Cross workers have not been oblivious but have utilized with a discretion that has resulted in the transformation of more than one objector into a valuable assistant in the work. There is no probability of our little community being unrepresented in shipments of Red Cross work the present fall.

With the lawns as green and as velvety as in spring, the pasture so luxuriant that the cattle will not come home to be fed, with the winter bean vines putting out pods as tender in fibre and as delicate in flavor as those we welcome in strawberry time, the roses as lovely as they can ever be and with a sky so unclouded that the rainy season seems as far distant as it does in June, it is hard to believe that mid October can be so near. There is however no setting aside the fact that school has opened for the winter term that the sun rises at six o'clock and sets at half past five, that the barns are filled with new hay and the store roomshelves with the preserved fruit and vegetables of a summer just past, that many of the song-birds have ceased their carol and are leaving for the South, that hop-picking is over and potato-digging about to begin, and that fires are as welcome in the mornings and evenings as they are in the January cold. Fall plowing and the planting of winter grain are the chief industries if we may except the sunpational land-clearing with its fires that never allow darkness to prevail, however persistently the moon may be hiding her face. The price of flour, even though kept within some sort of bounds by governmental decree is still high enough to determine every rancher who can possibly raise his own grain to do it in the coming year and throughout all future time. The charming weather brings out the many new autos that have come into our neighborhood within the year and social duties are receiving more attention than it was possible to give them while perishable fruit was ripening and there were hungry threshers to feed.

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
