MACKSBURG.

To the sincere regret of his parish-
ioners and other friends, Rev. Fr. Luc-
as is to leave for California in the pre-
sent week on account of ill health.
Every one associated with Father Luc-
as in the past few weeks had been in-
dulging hopes of his entire recovery
from the serious illness of last summer
when suddenly on Sunday Dec. 30th he
was stricken down in his pulpit by a
return of the disease, and will not be
able for several weeks at least to re-
sume his work. Father Lucas's last
sermon in preparation for leaving was
preached on Sunday, Jan. 6th.

The Mother's Club had a very busy
and interesting session on Thursday
last at the home of its secretary. It
being the first meeting in the new
year, election of officers was in order.
The president Mrs. John Hepler, the
vice-president Mrs. Simon Miller and
the secretary Mrs. G. M. Baldwin were
unanimously chosen for another year.
The club was organized in January
1915 and so has had three years of ex-
istence. The same officers, with the
exception of the first vice-president
who moved away two years ago, have
served throughout that time. No divi-
sion of the club had taken place till
about a year ago, the number of its
members had increased till it had grown
too large for accommodation in a pri-
vate home and a new club was formed
with Mrs. Chas. Keesling president,
Mrs. Herman Harms vice-president,
and Mrs. Schnack secretary. Both
clubs are trying to do something in
Red Cross work. Though not entirely
unanimous in this respect no serious
dissatisfaction has manifested itself on
either side, the Red Cross workers
deeming persuasive methods best in
such cause. The few misguided people
who regard this wonderful organization
with disfavor should be induced to look
forward to the close of the war when
the stupedons work of the Red Cross
shall be subject of comment and think
of the mortification of being obliged to
confess that they had nothing to do
with it. After the Civil War when the
surviving soldiers in relating their war
experience told of the unutterable re-
lief to the horrors of war wrought by
the sanitary commission they had not a
listener who did not feel in the depth
of his soul, a regret for not having done
more to help on that blessed work.
Assuredly greater is the Red Cross
headed by the President of the United
States than was the Sanitary Commis-
sion. Not to be a member of this won-
derful working society seems akin to
ostracism from our beloved Common-
wealth, a thought intolerable to every
lover of his native land to every well-
wisher of his native sons. Those
who have an apprehension of misap-
propriation of the funds must be told
that an enterprise so gigantic with a
membership so upumerable an object
so vast and a revenue so enormous is
sure to be managed with an accuracy
and efficiency equal to that of our
great banking system.
