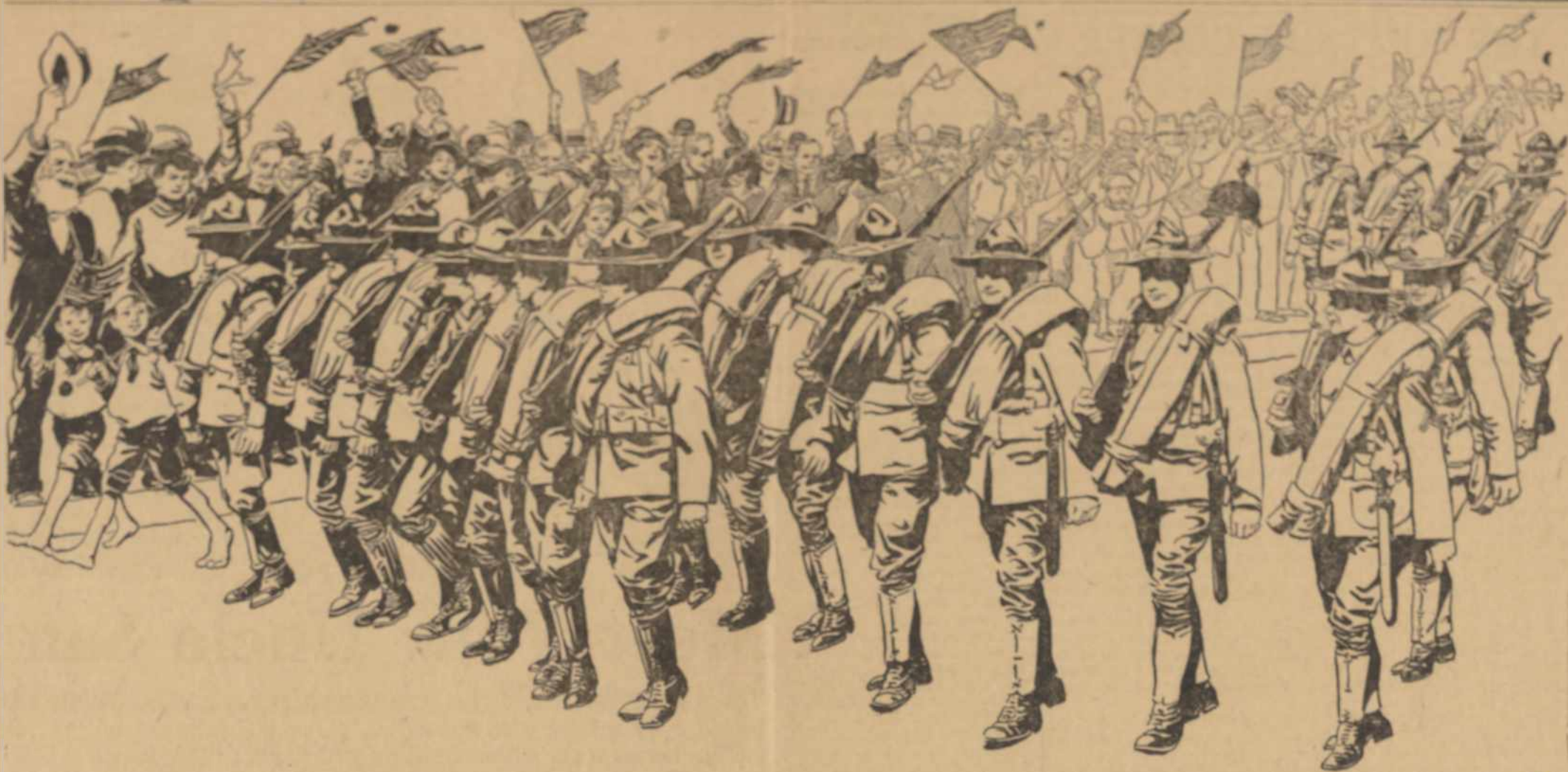




This War Must Be Fought On European Soil
