AMERICAN LOYALTY LEAGUE

The American Loyalty League re-
quires a pledge from its members,
which is nothing more than an oath of
allegiance to the government, and an
indorsement of its war work and war
aims. It is not political in its aims, but
its purpose is to weld together all loyal
citizens, to influence all to do their part
at home, and to weed out disloyal and
put the mark of the slacker upon all
shirkers.

Alleged cases of active pro-German-
ism will be run down by the members
of the league, and they are pledged to
hear all sides of the case and to give
the suspected one full opportunity of
exoneration before definite action be-
fore the officers of the league is taken.
It is the aim of the new movement to
cooperate with civic and federal
authorities in preventing destruction of
property by enemies in this country, and
to stop the unjust criticisms of the
government in its war policies.
