

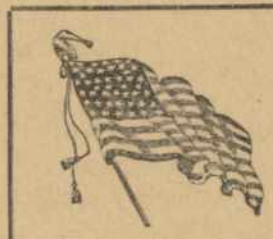

PURE AMERICANISM

The events of the past three and three-quarter years have shown that we have got to put a complete stop to the day of dual citizenship in this country. There is only room for one kind of man in this country, and that is an American who is an American and nothing else. There is no room for a fifty-fifty allegiance in this country. If any man says that he loves another country as much as he does this, send him to the other country. Accept no divided allegiance. We have room in this country for but nationality, the American nationality; for but one flag, the American flag; and that rules out the red flag of anarchy just as much as any other flag. And we have room in this country but for one language, the English language. —Theodore Roosevelt.

Our natural abhorrence of war must not blind us to the true meaning of this great conflict. This war involves all that men value—civilization, freedom, honor, safety to the weak, and human rights in general. Fate, which is providence working toward a righteous end, has decreed that we spare neither life nor suffering, neither peace nor ease, neither men nor treasure or anything else that must be sacrificed on the world's cross. This struggle, predicted in the minds of men as well as in the scriptures, is but part of the great conflict between good and evil. Germany not only made this war, but she has carried it on in an inconceivably savage manner. Those who refuse for any motive to make the sacrifices necessary to win it are false and faithless to the greatest cause in the world. Where such tremendous issues are involved, "he that is not with us is against us." Compromise is impossible. We cannot stop to analyze motives when the knife of the Hun is at the throat of civilization and Christianity—actions alone count.

The new law to punish disloyal acts and utterances is one of the most stringent ever enacted by Congress. It provides that those convicted of uttering or printing disloyal, profane, scurrilous, contemptuous or abusive language about the United States the government, or the form of government or the flag, may be sentenced to 20 years imprisonment or a fine of \$10,000, or both. The same penalties apply to those convicted of favoring Germany or her allies in the present war. Only one Congressman voted against the bill. The penalties are severe but so are the offenses. In war time, the rights that so many assume in peace-time, are practically suspended, and all citizens must be most temperate in their language, or trouble is bound to follow.

Some day peace will come. Thousands—millions of men—will suddenly be thrown back again into civil life. Consider the vastness of the readjustment that will be necessary. Look back at the period of reconstruction after our Civil War. Prepare for this new period of reconstruction. The day of reckoning is bound to come. Begin to save now. Thrift is the need of the present, the hope of the future. Liberty Loan Bonds, War Savings, the safest securities in the world, are a wise provision for the day peace comes.

Many people, even yet, do not realize our true relations to our allies. Our duties as American citizens require us not only to fight Kaiserism, but also to support our allies to the limit, and any citizen who now attacks any of the allies of America is a traitor to America—not only morally but legally. Both patriotism and the law demand that westand by our allies and oppose our enemies.

What the people of Lane county think of Allen Eaton and his pacifist principles is seen in his decisive defeat for representative. He came out as a candidate on a "vindication" platform. He took part in a meeting last summer of the People's Council for Democracy and Terms of Peace, and was "fired" as a state university professor on account of it.

The greater part of the world now looks to America as its chief hope of safety from tyranny, oppression, and frightfulness. America's mission is worth the devotion, the sacrifice, and the labor of every true American. Any man not willing to meet the test is a fake American.

It cost John McNary \$25.00 to say to his brother Senator McNary at Washington: "Hello Charley. This is John. We are giving you our congratulations. You are carrying the state by about 3 to 2 and possibly better." But it was worth it.

DAIRY IS A FIXED INDUSTRY

Where That Feeling Exists There Is Disposition to Raise Heifers or Baby Beef.

The farm dairy is becoming more of a fixed industry, and where this feeling exists there is a disposition to raise the calves—the heifers for the dairy or to be sold for dairy purposes, and the better calves will generally be fed into some form of baby beef as the feed and circumstances suggest.

WARM WATER MUCH CHEAPER

Otherwise Cow Must Burn High-Priced Corn and Other Feeds for That Purpose.

If the cows are forced to drink cold water they must warm the water in their bodies. This requires food in the form of corn and other feeds. It is much cheaper to warm the water with wood or coal than to allow the cow to burn high priced fuel in her body for this purpose.

SHORTHORNS GOOD FOR MILK

There Are Some That Are Excellent Producers, but They Are Not of the Beef Type.
