OBITUARY

The following obituary is copied from the Sugar Creek Budget (Ohio). Isaac S. Miller was the father of Mrs. S. A. Miller, and was known to many people here:—

Isaac S. Miller was born in Holmes Co., Ohio, May 10, 1838, died at his home in Howard Co., Ind. May 28, 1918; aged 80 years, 18 days.

About 4 weeks before he died, he had a stroke of paralysis, after which his left side was helpless and the evening before he died he seemed to be as usual and the next morning when his wife who was sleeping with him woke up, she found him dead. It was thought he had another stroke which caused instant death.

He was married to Elizabeth Boyer in 1860 in Holmes Co., O. where they lived for sometime. From there they moved to Iowa where they lived 2 years from there to Indiana, lived there two years then to Illinois lived there 14 years, then to Oregon, where they lived 34 years, then 4 years at the place where he died.

To this union were born 11 children, 5 of them have preceded him to the beyond, leaving his aged companion, 6 children, 29 grand children and 5 great grand children to mourn his departure. They need not mourn as those who have no hope, as he was steadfast in his faith to the end.

He was a member of the Amish church, and always attended church when health permitted.

His children are namely Miriam of Aurora, Ore., O. I. Miller of Nampa, Idaho; Jemima Yoder, Lovina Aelmuth, Dora Gingerich of this place and Delila Brower of Ashland, Oregon. Funeral was held on the 30th; services conducted by Rev. John J. Gingerich and Bishop David D. Schlabbach. Those present at the funeral from a distance were O. I. Miller of Nampa, Idaho; Miriam Miller of Aurora, Ore.; Emanuel Miller and wife, Joe P. Miller, Eli E. Schlabbach and Mrs. Yoder of Holmes Co., Ohio.
