More trouble in the enemy naval forces is reported. It is a curious thing that discontent in a military nation usually appears first in the navy. But possibly it is due to the fact that a warship is a separate unit; and that, once a crew is organized for trouble, it can pretty well pursue its own course, says Montreal Sun. From the outside, it would seem as if a post on the Kiel fleet would be about as tempting a position as exists today in the armed forces of Germany. There is a minimum of danger and a maximum of leisure.
