

**TWO VOTES NECESSARY
ATTORNEY GENERAL SHOWS**

When the legal voters of a road district meet on the question of levying a tax in excess of the preceding year, plus the 6 per cent allowed by the constitution, the procedure, if it is decided to make the levy, requires two motions, according to an opinion of General Attorney Brown in response to an inquiry. He says:

"The legal voters of the road district should first vote upon the question whether a tax shall be levied in excess of that for the preceding year, plus 6 per cent thereof, and if this question receives a majority of the votes of such legal voters, then the question of levying the tax and the amount thereof should be separately submitted."

The government's August crop report estimates the American hop crop approximately as follows:

New York	3,000 bales
Washington	21,000 bales
Oregon	18,000 bales
California	14,000 bales
Total	56,000 bales

Picking and holding are rule, are purely speculative, except in those cases where dealers have made heavy advances for enticing and picking. Even then the speculative feature is only transferred from the grower to the dealer.
