WAR EMERGENCY COURSE AND CERTIFICATE OREGON NORMAL SCHOOL

Owing to the scarcity of teachers the Oregon Normal School will offer a War Emergency Course of twenty weeks outlined by the Superintendent of Public Instruction. The course will begin with each of the terms commencing Nov. 16, 1918; Feb. 8, 1919; and April 12, 1919. The Superintendent of Public Instruction will consider it equivalent to the Teachers' Training Course and issue a certificate upon its completion valid to teach in the elementary grades for one year.

This Course will be open to those who have had two years or more of high school work or its equivalent and who are at least 18 years of age.

LAFOLLETTE DESERTS PARTY AND BETRAYS FRIENDS

Walter L. Tooz, chairman of the Marion county Republican Central Committee, questions the truth of A. M. La Follette's assertion that 2500 Marion county voters petitioned him to become an independent candidate for state senator. It appears that Bill Cherrington, an 80-year-old Salem piano dealer has broken into politics as Alec's manager. Some months ago, before the primary election figures were cold, Cherrington announced that more than 2000 voters desired LaFollette to run as an independent. Mr. Tooz says one of the solicitors for signers was a Salemite named Gans who is well known as a solicitor at 5 cents per. Cherrington has said time and again that "Mr LaFollette did not know a thing about the circulation of those petitions" and that "it was a spontaneous out burst of public clamor of the voters that caused Mr. La Follette to stand for senator". Will Mr. Cherrington or Mr. LaFollette be frank enough to say who paid the solicitors that secured the signatures, and just how much it cost.

Further, LaFollette says he has violated no pledges made before the May primary. Official records give the lie to this statement. In his statement (sworn) to the secretary of state, La Follette declared: "I AM A DULY REGISTERED MEMBER OF THE REPUBLICAN PARTY. And among other promises in his declaration is this: "If I am NOT NOMINATED I will not accept the nomination or endorsement of any other party. Yet in the face of this sworn promise La Follette has accepted the nomination for senator on the democratic ticket.

These public records of his political perfidy show that he has violated his promises. He still claims that he is a Republican. But the Republican party in Marion county is bigger than any renegade candidate and it may have something to say November 5 on that point. Louis Lachmund and W. Al Jones the regularly nominated primary candidates are men of honor, energy and ability and should receive every Republican vote for state senator.

THE SPANISH INFLUENZA

Strange enough, the "Spanish influenza, known also as "Three Day Fever, and "The Flu", did not originate in Spain. Most medical writers believe it came from the Orient, where similar epidemics have started, though as far back as 1647, an epidemic was brought to America from Valencia, Spain. Since then there have been numerous epidemics, and in 1889 and 1890 one started some where in the Orient, spread to Russia, and thence over the whole civilized world. Three years later there was another flare up of the disease. Both times it spread all over the United States.

In most cases of influenza the person affected feels sick rather suddenly. He feels weak, has pains in the eyes, ears, head or back, and may be sore all over. Many patients feel dizzy, some vomit; most feel chilly, but a fever soon comes with a temperature of 100 to 104 degrees. The patients look sick. There may be some cough, a running from the nose and the eyes and undersides of the eyelids may be slightly "bloodshot."

Ordinarily the fever lasts three or four days and the patient recovers. Deaths from it are usually the result of a complication—with pneumonia or other disease. Influenza is a germ disease, and spreads from person to person, the germ being carried in the air along with very small droplets of mucus expelled by coughing, sneezing, etc., by one who has the disease. The germs may also be carried about in the air as dust coming from dried mucus from persons who have the disease spitting on sidewalks or floors.

Persons sick with influenza should go to bed at once. This will help to head off dangerous complications and will prevent scattering the disease far and wide. No one should be allowed to sleep in the same room with the patient. Infact, only the nurse should be allowed in the room. Discharges from the throat, mouth, nose or eyes should be collected on gauze or paper napkins and burned. Only medicine prescribed by a doctor should be taken. Your physician should be called at once.

To guard against influenza (and disease of all kinds), the body should be well clothed, the food wholesome sufficient, and well-cooked. Milk is one of the best all-round foods obtainable. Work, rest and play in proper proportion are important. Well ventilated living and sleeping rooms cannot be over emphasized. Keep out of crowds and stuffy places. Keep homes and workplaces well aired. Breathe free and deeply, of good fresh air, but "cover up each cough and sneeze. If you don't you'll spread disease."
