

ARTICLES YOU CANNOT SEND BOYS IN FRANCE

When you send Christmas parcels to the boys in France don't try to put any of the following articles in the package. If you do the Red Cross inspection committee will remove them, as such articles are barred from the mails:

- Intoxicating liquors of all kinds.
- All poisons or articles containing poison.
- Explosives of all kinds.
- Inflammable materials including friction matches.
- Mechanical or chemical devices which may explode or ignite. This will include cigarette lighters.
- Liquids or fragile articles and other inadmissible matter when not packed according to regulations.
- All articles which may kill or injure another or injure the mails or other property.

La Follett's Pledge to the Voters of Marion County

To Ben W. Olcott, secretary of state of Oregon and to members of the Republican party and the electors of the county of Marion comprising the first senatorial district in the state of Oregon. I, Alex M. La Follett reside in Waconda precinct, county of Marion, state of Oregon, and my Postoffice address is Gervais, Oregon, R. F. D. No. 2. I AM DULY REGISTERED MEMBER OF THE REPUBLICAN PARTY. If I am nominated for the office of state senator at the primary nominating election to be held in the first senatorial district in the state of Oregon the 17th day of May, 1918, I will accept the nomination and will not withdraw, and if I am elected I will qualify as such officer. IF I AM NOT NOMINATED I WILL NOT ACCEPT THE NOMINATION OR ENDORSEMENT OF ANY OTHER THAN THE ONE IN WHICH I AM REGISTERED.

Alex M. La Follett signed this solemn pledge to the legal voters of this county and state and on August 27, 1918, Alex M. La Follett proceeded to DO and did that which HE HAD PLEDGED that the people he would not do, To wit: Salem, Oregon, August 27, 1918. "I Alex M. La Follett of Gervais, R. F. D. No. 2 county of Marion state of Oregon the identical person named in the Certificate of Nomination, issued by the Governor of the state of Oregon as having received the nomination for the office of state senator, first senatorial district, at the primary nominating election of the Democratic party, held on May 17th, 1918, hereby accept the said nomination for the said office to be held in the state of Oregon on the 5th day of November, 1918, tendered to me by the electors of said party at said primary nominating election.

AURORA MUST DIG UP \$450 FOR UNITED WAR WORK

The United War work campaign which opens November 11 calls for \$450 from the Aurora school district. The campaign lasts one week November 11 to 18.

This part of the county has been divided into "Divisions" as follows: Aurora, Butteville, Donald, St. Paul Hubbard and Woodburn. Each division will be responsible for a certain number of school districts, except in cases like Aurora (on the county line) there may be but one district in a "division". The "division chairman appointed for this part of the county are:

The county chairman has suggested that 10 solicitors be named in each school district. The banks will be the official depositories of the funds. Instructions to the solicitors say, "Don't apologize or assume the attitude of a beggar. You are representing a great array of institutions that have been called together to help win the war. You represent the Government, these institutions, and the Boys in France. It is an honor to do this work and all should esteem it as such or refrain from taking part."

PROPERTY VALUATIONS RISE IN MARION COUNTY

The final equalization of the assessed valuation of Marion county property, not including public utilities, shows an assessment of \$37,610,680. The farm lands and the town and city lots have fallen off slightly in value. Automobiles have increased 45 per cent. There are 590 less horses in the county than last year. Cattle, pigs, sheep and goats have all increased in number. The 15,398 head of cattle are valued at an average of \$35.84, the 21,225 sheep and goats at \$6.69 each; 8355 head of swine at \$10.25 each; the 6781 horses and mules at \$27.15 each; and the 163 dogs at \$21.08 each.
