NO LICENSES REQUIRED NOW TO BUY SALTPETER

The Federal regulation regarding certain ingredients of explosives have been modified, so that saltpeter may be purchased and sold without a license—if not intended for use in the manufacture of explosives. Saltpeter for use in curing meats may now be purchased without a license.

All regulations relating to fireworks are revoked and no further license for fireworks will be required.

Restrictions on the use of Platinum, Iridium Palladium are removed.

Licenses for explosives, such as blasting powder, dynamite, etc., are still required.
