Roads Are Named

The location committee Tuesday designated the market roads proposed to be paved in Marion county. The roads designated for the north end are as follows:

Aurora to Donald via the Chris Giesy farm, Donald to Champoeg, thence to Gearin's corner to join road from St. Paul to the Newberg bridge.

Silverton and Mt. Angel to Woodburn thence to St. Paul.

Hubbard to the Pudding River bridge, east, and to Broadacres, west.

The committee were unanimously in favor of the cities taking care of their own roads (streets) within the city limits, the market roads to be built only to the city boundaries.

These recommendations will be made to the full committee, and if approved will be incorporated in a petition to the county court to call a special election June 3, to vote upon the question of issuing bonds to build the roads designated.

The location committee consists of Hurley Moore of Woodburn; George Hubbs of Silverton; Jos. J. Keber of Mt. Angel; J. P. Feller of Donald; J. E. Smith of St. Paul; W. A. Taylor of Macleay; H. L. Downing of Shaw; George Keetch of Stayton; Theodore Roth of Salem; David H. Looney of Jefferson and W. M. Hamilton of Salem.

"Don't place 1919 War Saving Stamps on 1918 folders (saying certificate)", says Mrs. Diana Snyder, the Aurora postmaster. "If your 1918 folder (certificate) has blank spaces, just put the certificate away without filling it with 1919 stamps. The same thrift stamps and thrift cards are used this year, but the war stamps of 1919 are different from those of last year, and the two kinds of war stamps MUST NOT be placed on the same certificate."

Superintendent of schools W. M. Smith of Salem states that the bill fixing the salaries of county officers leaves the salary of the superintendent at \$1500 per year, and that deputy hire and traveling expenses were left at the discretion of the county court. It appears the chief change made by this legislature in Marion county salaries was to increase the county treasurer's salary from \$1200 to \$1500.

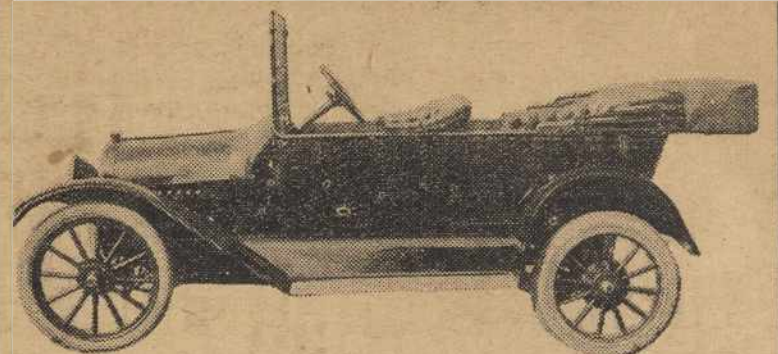
