NOTICE OF SCHOOL MEETING

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN To the legal voters of Joint School Dist. No. 23 Marion and 303 of Clackamas County, State of Oregon, that a SCHOOL MEETING of said District will be held at the school house, on the 16th day of June, 1919, at 2:00 o'clock in the afternoon to vote on the proposition of levying a special district tax, and of increasing the tax by more than six per cent over the district tax levied in 1918.

The total amount of money needed by the district during the fiscal year beginning on June 17, 1919, and ending on June 30, 1920, is estimated in the following budget and includes the amounts to be received from the county school fund, state school fund, special district tax, and all other moneys of the district:

During April the people of Oregon bought 899,000 gallons of gasoline and 568,000 gallons of distillate from the Standard Oil Company. On these sales there was a tax of \$20,780. Other oil companies sold smaller quantities.

The Aurora-Needy ball game Sunday resulted in a score of 12 to 4 in favor of Aurora. Another game will be played Sunday between Macksburg and Aurora at the "Gilbertson Park" north of Aurora.

Mr. and Mrs. George Miller received a telegram Tuesday from the "Miller Twins," stating that they arrived at Tacoma (Camp Lewis) that day, with Base Hospital No. 46. They expect to be home in a few days. They left Camp Merritt last Thursday.

Ben W. Stoner arrived home the 15th from Washington, D. C. having received his discharge. He was a member of the 63rd Infantry, which has been stationed at Washington for the past 4 months. Both of the Stoner boys are now home, Edwin a brother, having arrived about two weeks ago.

The last legislature passed a law requiring bakers to make loaves of bread that shall weigh either one pound, one and a half pounds, or two, three, four, or five pounds, and the loaves must not vary more than one ounce from those figures. Housewives should see to it that their loaves are full weight. Light weight loaves should be reported to the dairy and food commissioner.

Electa Mark, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Coleman Mark of Mark's Prairie, who recently underwent a critical operation for appendicitis at the Oregon City hospital, has improved so that she was able to be taken to her home Wednesday evening. Mrs. Mark, who has been at the home of her sister, Mrs. Grant B. Dimick, during her daughter's illness, has also returned to her home.—Oregon City Enterprise.

Fire, which originated in the second story, burned the Brooks hotel to the ground about 3 o'clock Wednesday afternoon. It was of frame construction and contained about 20 rooms. It was chiefly occupied by employees at the paving plant near by and men working on road crews. Few managed to save their belongings. It is said the building was partially covered by insurance.—Gervais Star.
