## NOTICE OF SCHOOL ELECTION TO INCREASE TAX MORE THAN SIX PER CENT OVER THAT OF THE PREVIOUS YEAR.

Notice is hereby given to the legal voters of School District No. 23 of Marion and 303 of Clackamas County, State of Oregon, that an election will be held in said District at the School House on the 16th day of June 1919, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon, to vote on the question of increasing the amount of the tax levy in said District for the year 1919, by more than six per cent over the amount of such levy for the year immediately preceding.

It is necessary to raise this additional amount by special levy for the following reasons: This increase is necessary because of the increase in teachers salaries, higher cost of all material, also to build a proposed building to house the pupils during rainy weather.

## BIRDETTES
