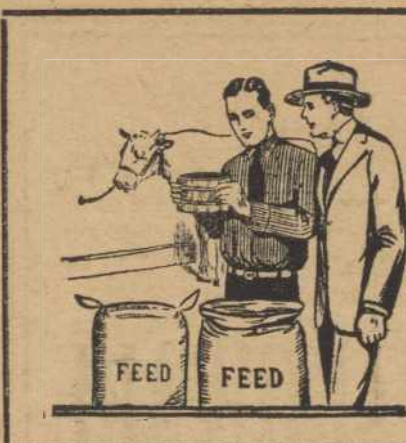

The directors of the Aurora State Bank held a regular meeting Tuesday. The officials there were Dr. B. F. Giesy, Chas. Kraxberger, J. H. Miley, R. H. Crisell, Zeno Schwab and I. A. Miley.

Emil Mieske, a brother-in-law of W. J. Uppendahl, holds the record for fast transit from civilian life to the French trenches. He left his home in this county for Camp Lewis June 23 and received his baptism of fire at the French front August 9.

The 148th field artillery has left Orest for New York. Allen McDonald, a grand nephew of Mrs. J. S. Vandeleur of this place, belongs to this regiment, and is on his way home with it, according to information received by his grand mother, Mrs. Diana McDonald, who is here visiting her sister, Mrs. Vandeleur.

Police officials of Oregon are handing out the advice of the car owners to watch their automobiles as a precaution against thieves. Many auto thefts have occurred all over the state recently. Often the thieves steal only the tools and the spare tires, though sometimes they wreck the car by taking parts of the engine and equipment.

Mr. and Mrs. George Clester have rented the Luebbens house on Pacific street and will move in soon. They come from Molalla, accompanied by Mr. Clester's brother Charles who recently returned from Camp Lewis where he was in the army service as a skilled blacksmith. The brothers have opened a shop here at the old location on Main street.

Jack Rose returned this week from a year's service in France where he served in an ammunition train, engaged during hostilities, in conveying ammunition to the front, often over roads under shell fire from the Hun guns. He came here to visit Mrs. Diana Snyder and family. After visiting his step-father Mr. Schwartz in Montana, he may return here for a few days and will then go to Panama and Brazil. He has a coffee plantation in the latter country.

Bible services will be held at the Fargo church by Rev. Edwin Rantin, of West Salem, beginning next Tuesday evening at 8 o'clock.

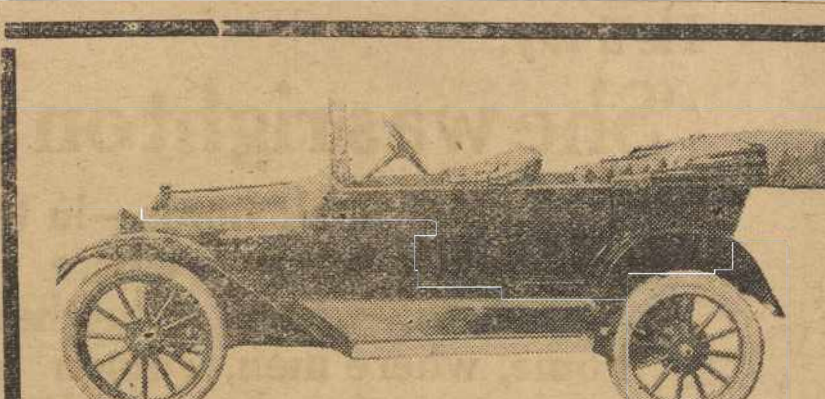
