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MARION COUNTY CROPS HAVE FINE PROSPECTS

L. J. Chapin, well known here as field agent for the Salem King's Products Co., gives out the following concerning Marion county Crops:

Winter grain is looking exceptionally good. Vetch will be a bumper crop while last year it was destroyed by the aphid of which there is none this year. Farmers are now clipping a fine crop of clover. Corn in the valley is looking extra fine and the acreage is much larger than one year ago. Many farmers are planning to build silos next winter. Strawberries are just mid-dling fair. Loganberries promise one of the largest crops ever known and picking will begin in some localities by June 20. There is a bumper peach crop in sight and many are thinning. Cherries and pears may be just a fair crop. Prunes will average hardly 50 per cent of a crop.

DEMOCRACY MEANS RESTRAINT.

Have you noticed how men naturally fall into line these days? They no longer crowd about the ticket window in the railroad station, even when there isn't anyone to tell them that "the line forms on this side." Outside the movie show, they take their turn by quietly forming a line clear down the street, instead of creating a mob. There have been a number of influences at work to "organize" crowds of men into orderly groups, but there's no doubt that men have unconsciously been disciplined by the soldiers who helped form these lines, for about every other man buying railroad and movie tickets has worn the uniform, writes Rev. Charles Stelzle in Milwaukee Journal. The soldiers, trained to do things in an orderly fashion, have been exerting a wholesome influence. Don't let's fool ourselves that the coming of democracy means unbridled license. It means greater restraint. We imagine that a democratic form of government is the simplest—it isn't—it's the most complex and most difficult to administer. The simplest form is that of the autocrat.

One of the interesting things that took place during the war, and was not announced to the public, although it became known to many, was the first use of apparatus to transmit speech from the earth to the upper air. In proving the utility of this newly invented system of wireless telephony, President Wilson himself directed the evolution of a squadron of military airplanes, which seems, incidentally, to have been the first time in the history of the United States when the president, as commander in chief of the army, directed orders by word of mouth to any military subordinate lower in rank than general. The episode was kept secret for good military reasons, as was shown when the new method of communication was put in practice in France. It enabled aviators to speak with one another and with officers on the ground, and was at once a great help to the allies and a puzzle to the enemy.

Salvador is to have a presidential election without contest, as the voluntary retirement from the race of Dr. Tomas Garcia Poloma, thus leaves the field to Dr. Quinones Molina alone. That little republic has recently appeared to be carefully studying how to avoid all internal controversy, that it might be the better prepared to take advantage of external opportunities, opportunities which, by the way, have been greatly improved as a result of her open and pronounced sympathy with the United States and the allies.

The landing of a cargo of sand for trench work in the Egyptian desert by command of somebody high up in the British war office recalls the story of that earlier order to a British admiral to sail up the Bronx river with his squadron and give battle to the Revolutionary army.

The Germans still cherish hopes that America will stand their friend at the peace table. The sinking of the Lusitania and the bombing of American Red Cross hospitals are, of course, strong and convincing reasons why we should feel kindly toward them.

Norway wants 1,000,000,000 crowns indemnity from Germany for ships sunk. It looks like a solid claim to us. One of the chief embarrassments about defeat is to settle for the furniture that was smashed during the height of the spree.

Von Bethmann-Hollweg is disloyal enough to declare that his former minister, the kaiser, did not tell the truth in what he said about the cruise in Norwegian waters. The lion must truly be dead!

It is said that the former crown prince of Germany spends most of his time with his favorite greyhound, showing that a greyhound has not enough judgment to take advantage of its superior speed.

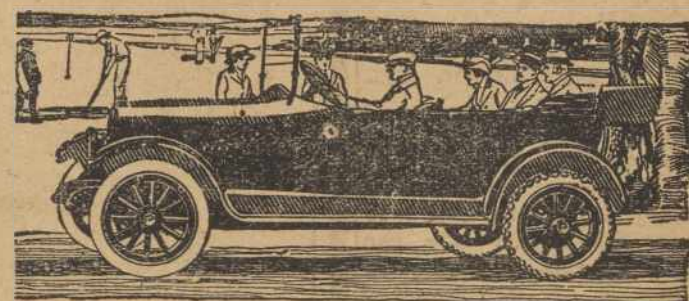
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
