The future of the fruit industry demands that the growers and manufacturers of fruit products of the Willamette Valley get together and work in harmony. A continuance the present litigation of the big companies, the fruit unions, and the growers will prove disastrous to all their interests—and to the consuming public as well. Producers and manufacturers of their products must sooner or later recognize the fact that it is not their interests alone that are involved. The public is a third party with an interest fully as great as theirs. Prolonged refusal to take cognizance of this fact will only lead us further along the road toward radicalism. This may appear to many as a revolutionary doctrine, but only the blind fail to see the present trend of events. Economic and political changes come like the whirlwind—and according to natural laws as certain as those that produce the whirlwind—when the conditions are right.

William F. Woodward, one of the directors of the Portland Public Library proposes to exclude all foreign language newspapers from files of the library as a step toward Americanization, contending that the events of the past four years justifies the directors in putting a complete ban on all newspapers and magazines not published in the American language.

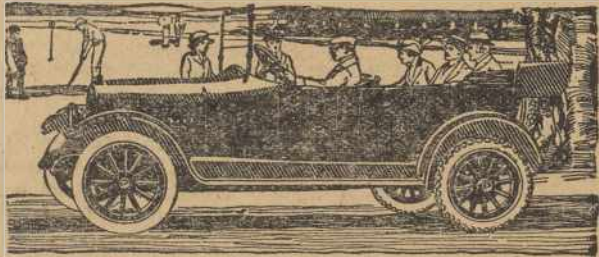
