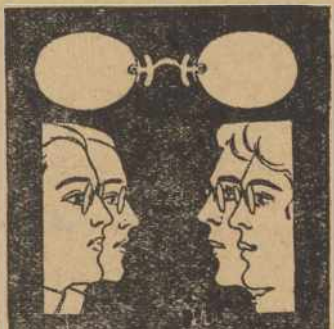

BROOKS PAVING SCARE MORE FANCIED THAN REAL

The alleged defective paving at Brooks appears mostly to have been confined to irregularity in spreading the material. Sinton Benson, chairman of the Highway commission, says the mixture has been found all right, and goes on to say: "The contractors were not as experienced as some others and made the mistake of making the pavement a little too thin along the edges and thicker than necessary in the middle, but if the quality is good that does not mean the pavement will be rejected."

Numerous cuttings from the pavement, made by experts, shows that the pavement is thicker in many places, than the required five inches. The mixture has been found good in every case. J. M. Myer, the state inspector on the work near Gervais, has been suspended, pending a complete investigation.

While it appears that the defective pavement scare has been more fancied than real, the upheaval may put the fear of God, Governor Olcott and Mike Keppinger into the hearts of the paving contractors and enable them to see that five inches is five inches.
