## "VIPERS IN OUR MIDST"

The American Legion of Oregon has compiled a list of all aliens who revoked their first citizenship papers in order to avoid military service during the war, and have submitted the list to employers, asking for the immediate discharge of any employes whose names may be found on the list.

The letter accompanying the list of names says, "We feel that these men are vipers in our midst. While we were gone, they held our jobs at high wages and are now unwilling to relinquish them to the men who made these jobs secure. We feel that we owe it to ourselves and to the men who 'lie sleeping in Flanders Fields, to see that these men who are forever barred from citizenship be returned to the shores whence they came."

The list of "vipers" to whom the returned soldiers of the American Legion object consists of 128 names of men scattered over the state but mostly from Portland. The only Marion or Clackamas county aliens are: Advin K. Marinous, Silverton; Magnus N. Tillman, Silverton; Alfred Gronland, Oregon City; Hans Zenger, Oregon City; Anton Barnnan, Salem.

The Southern Pacific's income for 1918 was \$69,000,000 according to its report just filed with the Public Service Commission. This is ten million less than the previous year. Of the income stated, \$38,000,000 came from the government for its use of the road under lease. Taxes amounting to almost \$1,500,000 were paid by the company.

Umatilla county's wheat crop is estimated at 4,500,000 bushels, worth \$10,000,000. Harvest is in progress there, and Pendleton will soon be spending the money. Every one from Umatilla county registers from Pendleton!

## VACCINATION

Sporadic outbreaks of such diseases as typhoid and small-pox throughout the state serve to remind us that every possible precaution should be taken to prevent their spread. Typhoid prophylactics consists of using only uncontaminated food and water, and inoculation with typhoid serum. By these means the army has been almost freed of that disease. For smallpox vaccination is now considered an almost certain preventative. In the Philippines, in the course of a few years, the writer saw the death rate reduced from thousands per year to practically nothing through almost universal vaccination with in the archipelago! At the end of six years about the only cases of smallpox were those brought into the islands from Japan and China. The eradication of the disease under American health officers these established beyond doubt the efficacy of vaccination.

The appearance of the disease in the Valley is causing physicians to sound a warning word. Locally, Dr. Giesy has secured vaccine, and the people of this section are urged to take precautions against the contagion by being vaccinated. Such action, generally, throughout the state is urged and approved by the state board of health.
