The U. S. grain corporation has extended the time for the acceptance of trade agreements from July 31 to August 20. Grain dealers, millers, flour jobbers, bakers, etc., should secure their blanks and have them accepted, provided they return them signed before August 20 to M. H. Houser, second vice president of the U. S. Grain Corporation, Portland.

Senator Alex LaFollette says he is shipping the largest crop of peaches he has ever grown, about 20,000 boxes. Today he has ten pickers busy in his orchards. He figures that the price will average along between 65 to 90 cents a box. Last year his total crop was 5000 boxes, while three years ago it was 14,000. He says he doesn't ever want such a large crop again as it is too hard on the trees. In his orchard there are 30 acres and he grows 27 varieties, he says.

Big yields of grain are reported here by threshermen. Henry Smith's wheat went 52 bushels per acre and other farmers are reporting 45 per acre.

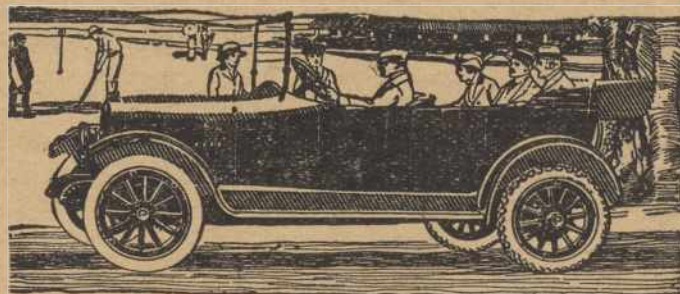
