County News Notes

Matters in Which You Are Interested in Both Marion and Clackamas Counties.

During September 2056 automobiles were registered at the secretary of state's office. The total registration for 1919 is now 89,354. The license fees collected amounted to \$587,596. Most of this goes to swell the road funds.

Van Trump, county fruit inspector, estimates the value of the Marion county apple crop at \$100,000. The best grades will bring \$1.75 per box, and other grades used for jellies, jams, cider, etc. will bring \$1.12 per ton.

The Phez Company at Salem expect to use 3,000,000 (or 1500 tons) of apples this fall—mostly in the manufacture of Appju which is a sort of an aristocratic cider, drunk by J. P. Morgan, Louis Lachmund and the editor of the Observer.

It is reported that the Marion county commissioners are contemplating the purchase of two more paving plants, which are to be used next spring to start the paving of the "market roads" authorized by the people last June. The plants cost about \$15,000 each. The county already owns one plant.

The annual campaign for Red Cross members will take place in Marion county next month—November 3-11—ending on Armistice Day. One half the membership fees will be used for local (home) work, and the other half will be sent to headquarters.

According to the Oregon City Banner-Courier, open violation of the game law is going on at Marks Prairie and that many birds were killed before the season opened. But it is not probable that Marks Prairie shoots any more holes in the game law than other localities do.

Examinations for persons to act as census enumerators in the first district of Oregon will be held under civic service regulations at Salem during the last week in October, according to an announcement Saturday of Supervisor of Census H. R. Crawford. All persons wishing to take the examination should write or apply to Mr. Crawford, post office building, before October 15.

She has lived in Marion county nearly 25 years, and was greatly respected and much loved by Gervais people.

Overdoses of Sugar Cause of Throat Disturbances Is Statement of Medical Man

Singers frequently complain of catarrh and nearly always blame the American climate for their trouble. Do the singers, however, sufficiently consider the food they eat? We have been informed by a medical expert, whom we respect as an authority, that most of the throat disturbances in the United States are caused by overdoses of sugar. He says he has proved his statement on a number of vocalists of various temperaments and physical characteristics by inducing them to eat excessively of sugar and sweet diet late in the evening and then to observe most carefully the condition of their throats and tongues in the morning. After he had brought on catarrhal troubles through the abuse of sugar he invariably restored the vocal chords to their normal condition by putting his patients on a salt diet and prohibiting the sugar diet.

We are but quoting a doctor's conversation and we do not for a moment pose as medical experts ourselves. We believe, however, that the doctor's advice should at least receive careful consideration.—Exchange.

HOP NOTES

The Metzler hops and hop houses that burned a short time ago in Yamhill county were covered by insurance—the buildings for \$1500 in the Hop Grower's Fire Relief Association and the 17,000 pounds of hops in the same association and in an old line company at about 25 cents a pound. The hops were contracted in two lots at 20 cents and at 30 cents, hence the companies very liberally compromised at 25 cents. The hops were contracted by Henry L. Bents for Strauss & Co. of London.

ANTI-NICOTINE-PILL BILL

The ballot title for the anti-cigarette bill has been prepared by the attorney general and "Jack" Frost, of Oregon City, and other friends of the bill will now have to rustle 10,000 signatures in order to get the bill on the ballot. The purpose of the bill as stated in the ballot title is as follows:

"Abolishing cigarettes by prohibiting the sale, use or possession thereof; also prohibiting soliciting receiving orders for, or making contracts for the sale of cigarettes; prohibiting the advertisement of cigarettes, providing that the words 'cigarette' or 'cigarettes' as used in type set shall be held to include cigarette, cigarettes, cigarette paper, cigarette wrapper, or any substitute therefor, or any paper or form prepared to be filled with tobacco for cigarette use; defining the duties of officers in enforcing this act and providing a penalty for its violation."

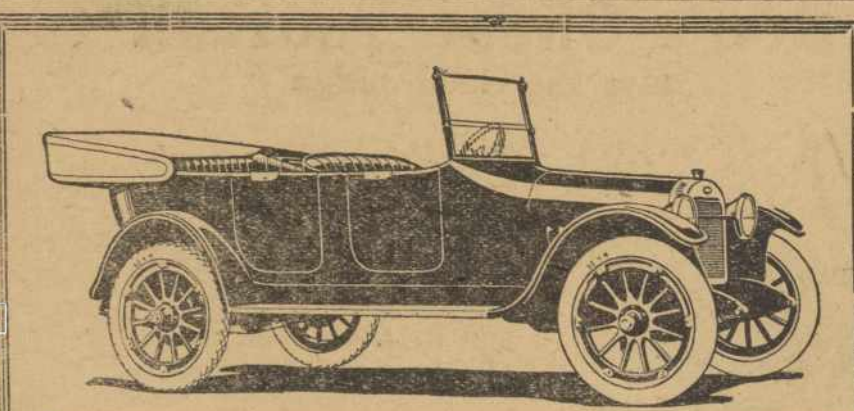

CLACKAMAS COUNTY'S NEW ROAD DISTRICTS

The Clackamas county court has abolished the old scheme for 57 road districts for Clackamas county, and has adopted a plan which conforms in a general way with the following boundaries, excluding incorporated cities and town, which under the state law, are separate road districts:

No. 1—Combines districts Nos. 1, 47 and 38, all north of the Clackamas and East of the Willamette, with a valuation of \$3,646,000, the largest of any district in the county. Practically all of the main roads in this district have been hardsurfaced and the district will not have roads coming under the bonding act.

No. 2—All of the territory in the county west of the Willamette river, with a valuation of \$2,869,000.

No. 3—Embraces the entire north boundary of the county east of the Willamette except that comprised in District No. 1, and taking in about half of the territory north of the Clackamas. Valuation \$2,650,000.

No. 4—Includes all territory lying south of District No. 3 to the Clackamas river, with a valuation of \$1,900,000.

No. 5—Bounded on the north by the Clackamas river, and including the territory tributary to the Logan and Springwater road. Valuation \$1,400,000.

No. 6—Includes the territory tributary to the Redland road from the pavement between Oregon City and Park-place to a point near Viola. Valuation \$800,000.

No. 7—Comprises the Highland road from Oregon City eastward to beyond Clarke's. Valuation \$1,231,000.

No. 8—Combines the districts of Carus, Central Point, McCord Hill and Kelland Hill. Valuation \$1,010,000.

No. 9—Extends from the limits of Oregon City south to Carus and west to the Willamette river and south to New Era, and combines the districts of Molalla, Dickey Prairie, Colton and Wilhoits and connects with the Pacific Highway at the O'Neil turn south of New Era. This district has the largest area of any in the county, with a population of 3,500,000.

No. 10—Connects with the Pacific Highway at Canby, running south to Marquam and Scotts Mills. Valuation \$1,310,000.

No. 11—Connects with the Pacific Highway at Barlow and extends south to Monitor, with a valuation of \$1,310,000.
