Tuesday, October 14, the hours of labor for women and minors were cut from 54 hours per week to 48, and the minimum wage raised from \$11.61 to \$13.20 per week. More than 9 hours work per day is not allowed. In mercantile establishments women and minors cannot be employed later than 8:30 p. m. In hotels, restaurants, lunch rooms, confectionery stores, ice cream parlors, etc., there are no restrictions as to the lateness of the hours, except that hours of labor must not exceed nine per day.

Ludwig von Beethoven, the eminent composer pianist who was born at Bonn, Austria, in 1770, was perhaps one of the greatest examples of patience ever known. "Until a Raphael he struck with blindness in the full freshness of his powers, Beethoven is without a compeer in the history of all ages, either in misery or in bliss."
