Matters In Which You Are Interested In Both Marion and Clackamas Counties.

The mint growers of the valley have been offered \$7.15 per pound for their products. They have been holding it for \$8 a pound.

During the last three months in Marion county, there have been issued 125 marriage licenses, and 23 divorce cases filed in the office of the county clerk.

Marion county has paved about 6 miles of road this year with its single plant, but figures are not yet available to show the cost per mile. In the spring three plants will be set to paving the market roads. No announcement has been made as to which roads will be paved next year.

Superintendent of schools W. M. Smith finds that Marion county school pupils have not only been very industrious but also thrifty during the summer vacation. He has found that some grade pupils have earned as high as \$110 during the midsummer vacation, and have saved it too. All of which augurs well for the outcome of the juvenile thrift campaign in the county schools.

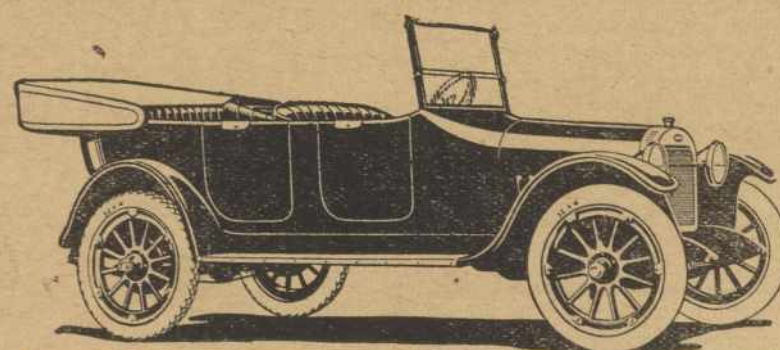

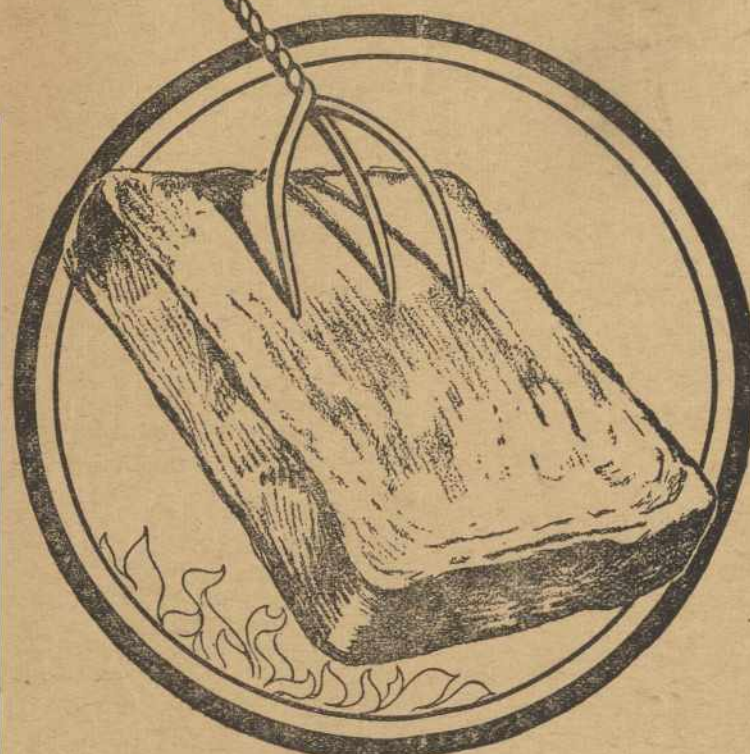
