MAP OF PROPOSED CLACKAMAS COUNTY ROADS

Many roads are proposed for paving, which are to link up the remote parts of the county with the Pacific Highway and lead into the county seat and other towns of the county. The roads of this part of the county adjacent to Aurora are the following: **District No. 2—Road A:**—From Wilsonville to Oswego via Frog Pond, Stafford, and Hazelia to Oswego, costing \$145,000. **District No. 9—Road A:**—From Pacific Highway west same crossing line of the Jos. Parrott D. L. C. south of New Era, thence southeasterly and southeasterly, via Mulino, Wrights Bridge, and Liberal to north boundary of city of Molalla. \$120,000. **Road B:**—From south boundary of city of Molalla towards Wilhoit, \$36,000. **District No. 10—Road A:**—From Canby, via Goods bridge, south toward Marquam, \$140,000. **Road B:**—From Macksburg to intersection of road "A", \$12,000. **District No. 11—Road A:**—From Barlow, thence south towards Monitor, \$132,000. **Road B:**—From south end of Wilsonville Ferry, thence southerly and southeasterly, \$12,000.
