COUNCIL BILL NO. 110

Entitled an Ordinance laying a tax on real and personal property in the City of Aurora, Ore.

The people of the City of Aurora do ordain as follows:

That a tax amounting to the sum of Eight Hundred and Fifty (\$850.00) dollars be and is hereby levied on the real and personal property within the corporate limits of the City of Aurora, Marion County, Oregon, as shown by the assessment roll of Marion County, Oregon for the year 1919. Said tax to be used for general municipal purposes.

Passed and approved by the Common Council of the City of Aurora, Marion County, Oregon, this third day of November, 1919.


