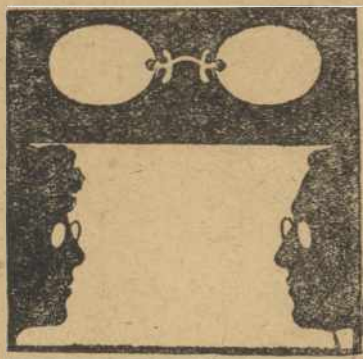

COUNCIL BILL NO. 110

Entitled an Ordinance laying a tax on real and personal property in the City of Aurora, Ore.

The people of the City of Aurora do ordain as follows:

That a tax amounting to the sum of Eight Hundred and Fifty (\$850.00) dollars be and is hereby levied on the real and personal property within the corporate limits of the City of Aurora, Marion County, Oregon, as shown by the assessment roll of Marion County, Oregon for the year 1919. Said tax to be used for general municipal purposes.

Passed and approved by the Common Council of the City of Aurora, Marion County, Oregon, this third day of November, 1919.

Dr. Livingston Farrand, the greatest authority on public health in America, served in France as the head of the fight against tuberculosis. He now succeeds Henry P. Davison as head of the American Red Cross. Dr. Farrand recently visited Seattle, Spokane and Portland and conferred with representatives of Red Cross Chapters of Alaska, Idaho, Oregon and Washington. "The Red Cross faces problems in the post-war period more serious, if possible, than the problems of the war itself. Not a great amount of money, but the membership and hearty co-operation of every American citizen is what is needed to help the Red Cross to solve these problems, which threaten our national vitality, and which, unless solved, will rob us of the fruits of victory," said Dr. Farrand.

Garland Brooks, accused of stealing an automobile belonging to George Hovenden of Hubbard, was arrested Saturday at Cottage Grove. He and a companion drove the car to Cottage Grove, abandoned it, and stole bicycles which they also abandoned just before their arrest.

Miss Midred Dedman, daughter of Dr. H. A. Dedman of Canby, has left the St. Vincent hospital where she was under treatment for an injury to her knee, received when alighting from a street car. Miss Dedman makes her home with an aunt in Portland while attending Reed College.

Clackamas county farmers complain that Marion county, Polk county and Benton county farms along the Willamette are infested with Canada thistles and that the seed is brought down to Clackamas county farms by the river. The Clackamas farm agent declares his county will be forced to take stringent measures to control the thistle pest.

The Marion county institute for teachers will meet at the Salem high school November 24, 25 and 26. All schools in the county will close during the institute, as attendance is compulsory. As the 27th is Thanksgiving, there will also probably be no school the rest of the week.

Linnie Willbrood of Macksburg (Aurora, Route 4) sent in 100 mole skins, to the Clackamas county mole Pool, which made a collection of mole skins, in the hands of R. G. Scott, county agent. He sold the collection of 760 skins at an average price of 22 cents each.

Sam A. Kozer, deputy secretary of state, has announced that he will be a candidate for the Republican nomination for secretary of state. E. E. Brodie, editor of the Oregon City Enterprise, will also be a candidate for the nomination. He will doubtless have the support of the state press.

It is claimed that less than 500 bales of hops remain in first hands in Oregon. Practically all the local lots here were sold before the 10th, except the Muecke lot of 45 bales. Prices as high as 87 cents have been reported for Oregon hops and 85 cents for Californians.

County Treasurer Drager and State Treasurer Hoff disagree over the time at which the former should remit the state's share of the taxes collected in Marion county. Hoff claims that \$64,064.30 should have been turned over to the state on November 1, and that failure to do so penalizes the county 6 per cent. Drager claims that December 1 is the correct date to turn over the funds, and that he intends to keep the state's share in the banks until that date, to secure the \$214 interest which it will earn the county in the extra 30 days.

Fred Bents of Fargo was here Saturday. Mr. Bents is expecting his son Clarence Bents to arrive soon from Siberia, though he has had no direct word from him since June. But others who have returned from that country and who knew Clarence Bents, say that all the American soldiers sent to Siberia last year will surely return soon. They report also that Clarence Bents' regiment saw plenty of active service and hard fighting, but that he came through it safely. He is about the only soldier from this section not yet home.
