BOTH PARTIES GUILTY

The failure of the Senate to ratify the Treaty of Peace reveals the fact that there are 72 senators who favor a league of nations—if they can only agree upon the exact terms. Thirty seven Democratic senators were in favor of "Wilson's League" without change. Thirty-five Republican senators voted for the league with reservations. Thirteen republicans and seven democrats are classed as no-league senators. As it requires but 64 votes to ratify a treaty, it is plain that failure to ratify may be attributed to a stiff necked, uncompromising attitude due far more to personal and political antagonism than to honest conviction. For this state of affairs both sides are to blame. It will be hard to make the average thinking American believe either side free from guilt.

Before congress convenes again for real work, the public may have reached a point where it will insist upon a rational compromise. For the people of this country will never approve a continuance of our present status. The nation has a duty to the world which it cannot repudiate but which it can not perform until all branches of the government honestly and efficiently work together.

It is said by those in a position to know that should Geo. A. White, former adjutant general of Oregon, desire to resume that position, Governor Olcott will re-appoint him. Others are skeptical, and seem to think that men who served as appointees of the late Governor Withycome stand little show of favors from the Olcott administration. Still others declare that Governor Olcott has made peace with the powers that formerly opposed him and that Withycome appointees are now persona grata.

Senator McNary is quoted as saying that he does not think it is the desire of the senate to kill the peace treaty. He believes not more than 15 senators out of 96 wish to kill it. Senator McNary favors the ratification of the treaty with the attached reservations which he does not regard as "nullifying" the treaty. He has faith that a League of Nations will eventually prove a great aid in preventing war.

Thieves entered the garage of county clerk Boyer at Salem last week, jacked up his flier, removed a tire and rim and took another tire and rim from the holder, and carried them all away in a horse-drawn buggy. Isn't that adding insult to injury?

The newspapers of Clackamas county may not welcome the competition of a free Farm Bureau News edited by the county agent. It is a poor plan to secure the co-operation of the legitimate press. But as a rule these bastard sheets die an early death.
