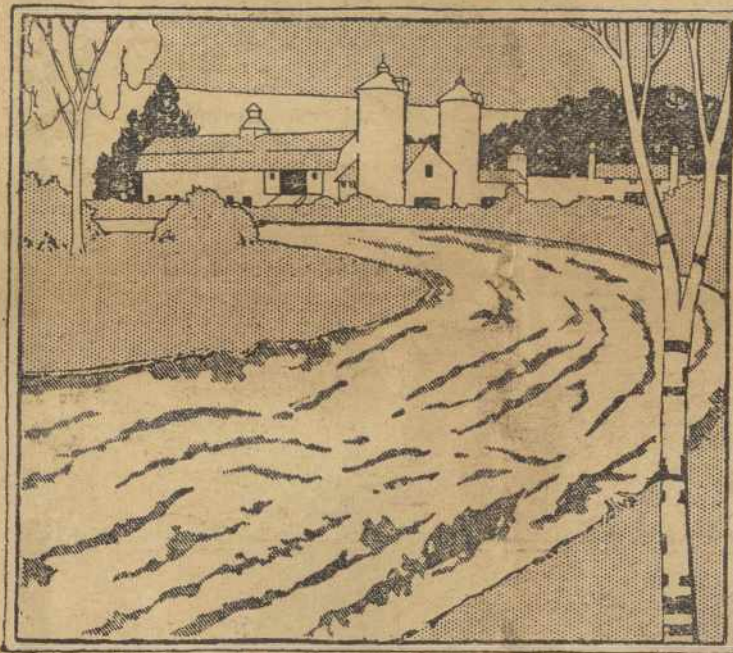
Chinese Typewriter.

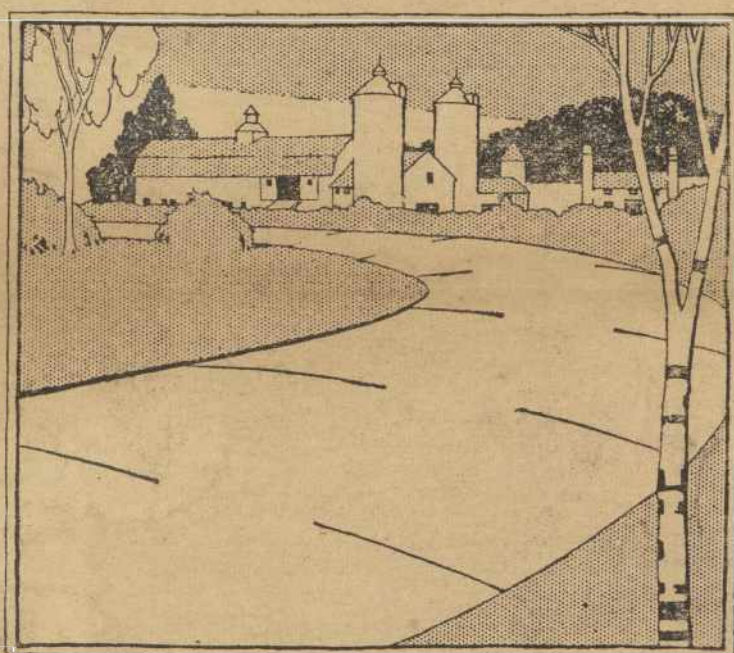

DOG TAXES SOON DUE.

Taxes on all dogs more than eight months old are due and payable January 1, 1920, according to a legal opinion given recently by L. H. Van Winkle, assistant attorney-general. This law which was passed at the last session of the legislature, applies to all dogs in the state. The tax on female dogs is \$2 a year and male dogs \$1 a year. Payment of the tax entitles the applicant to a leather collar and license plate, which must be furnished by the county in which the dog is licensed.

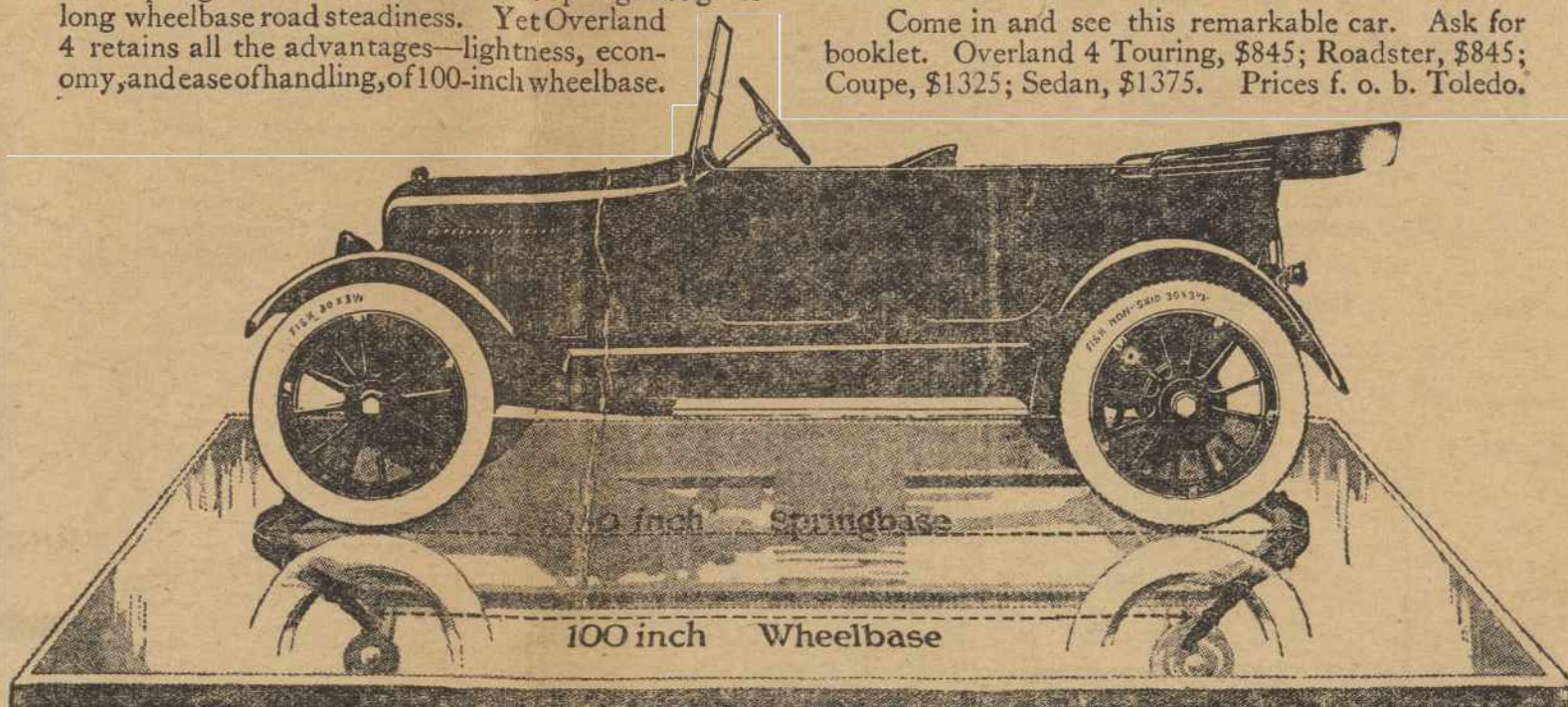
