**HEAVY CARS WASTE MONEY.**

**Schools Get More Money**

Marion county school apportionments have been made by superintendent Smith. The per capita apportionment of state funds amounts to \$1.95, and of county funds to \$5.32, a total per capita of \$7.27, or \$97,423.17 for the county.

Salem received \$29,000, Silverton \$7,000, Woodburn \$4,000 Hubbard \$2,000, Jefferson \$1,700.

Many districts have been without funds, and have had to pay interest on the warrants issued.

**POSTPONED**

The Marion County Federation meeting for tonight at Donald has been postponed to Thursday evening, Dec. 18, on account of the storm and the snow blocked roads.

**STORM BOUND**

Over two feet of snow had fallen by Wednesday night, practically stopping all travel and traffic Tuesday night. Two Willamette Valley Transfer trucks were stalled here, and two automobiles were pulled in by team. Many water pipes were frozen and captain "Wats" Snyder and his plumber's kit were called into action early.

Old residents declare this the worst storm since 1863. Snow still lies in the street to a depth of more than two feet. The thermometer dropped to 10 degrees above zero—22 degrees below freezing this morning at 8 o'clock.

**WORKING ON BRIDGE PLAN**

Engineer Garrow is working on the preliminary survey and plan for a new bridge across the Pudding River here. He will probably advise an entirely new concrete structure and approach on both sides of the river, and that the road way between the two bridges here be raised at least two feet.

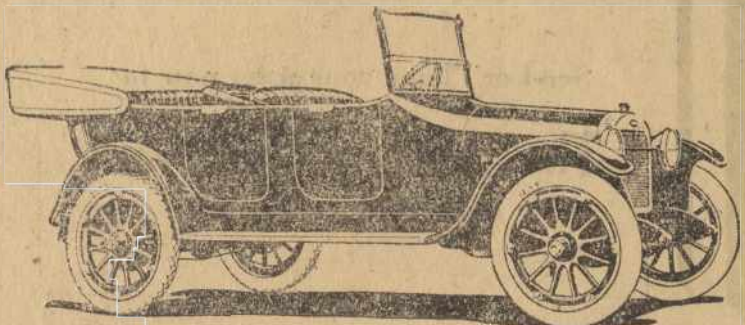
