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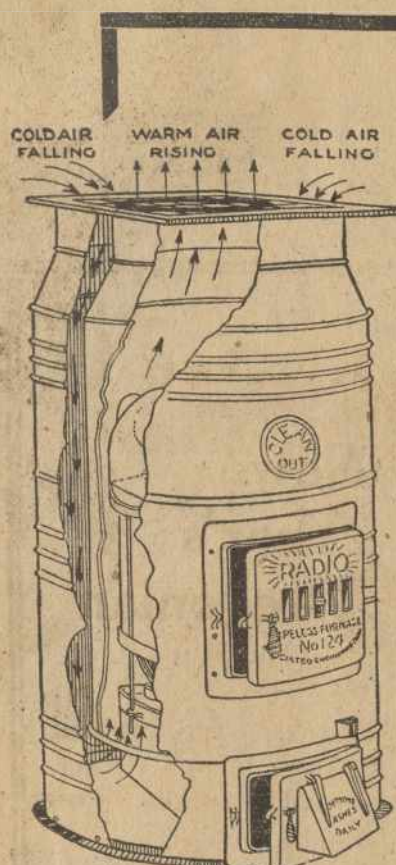
Governor Olcott has written A. H. Lea, secretary of the state fair board, insisting that in the future all concessions at the state fair must be lawful and moral, adding that in the future any concessions which are beyond the border line of legality and decency will be promptly closed by the proper authorities.

Salem newspapers boast of the successful campaign for the sale of Red Cross Christmas seals, in which the net results are 2 cents per capita. In Aurora, the sale of seals under the auspices of the Woman's Club amounted to 10 cents per capita, a 500 per cent better record than the Capital city. In the matter of Red Cross memberships, every third person in Aurora became a member. In Salem about one person in seven joined the Red Cross. Aurora is not so sleepy—compared with other places.

The re-election of Victor Berger to Congress is a disgrace to the State of Wisconsin. Berger has been expelled from congress, convicted of crime, and is under sentence to the Federal penitentiary, and was plainly untrue and unfaithful to his country in time of war, yet 25,000 Milwaukee voters re-elected him to the office from which he had been expelled, and to a seat which he can never hold. Where else could such a thing happen?

The secretary of the state fish and game commission is sending out "statements" to justify the "firing" of State Biologist Finley, ending up with the assertion the Board appreciates Mr. Finley's talents and ability and greatly regrets the lack of harmony which necessitated "firing" him for the good of the service. The affairs of the fish and game commission have been in more or less turmoil for years—with quarrels dissension and near-scandals that have lost it what little respect the people of state ever had for it. If Governor Olcott can purge this body of its malodorous repute he will accomplish a real reform. If "it can't be done", some one will come along one of these days with an initiative bill that will blow up the whole mess.

Parties who have been selling farmer's books to keep a record of their income and expenditures have been indicted by Federal grand juries on the charge of having represented themselves to be officers and employees of the Government. One company publishing such books took the firm name of the "Income Tax Record Bureau" which of course led farmers and others to believe it was a government agency and that the use of record books offered for sale was required by law. These indictments are a warning to all private concerns to avoid any advertising that may leave the impression that that are government agencies. No farmer or any one else is required to purchase any special record book for keeping an account of income and expenses.

ORCHARD GLEANINGS

RIGHT DEPTH FOR PLANTING

Character of Soil and Climate Should Govern—Roots Get Started If Planted in Fall.

The character of the soil and the climate of a region should not doubt govern the depth to which the roots of a fruit tree should be set. For most sections it is generally recommended that the roots be set a little deeper than they stood in the nursery. Very deep planting has been emphasized in the prairie states of the northwest, where there is danger of root injury by severe winters. Deep planting is also preferred in the plains where rainfall is very limited and the ground becomes very dry in winter. No doubt the roots should be set deeper in loose, sandy soils than in heavier soils. Most Missouri growers of long experience advocate setting a little deeper than the trees stood in the nursery. Many who have had limited experience set their trees much deeper than this, with the idea that the trees will stand straighter and firmer and that the roots are thus secured against drying out.

At the University of Missouri College of Agriculture shallow planting has given better results than deep planting. This point has been tested repeatedly in different years and the results of deep and shallow planting have been observed in many orchards of the state. The results indicate that a majority of the trees set in Missouri are planted too deep. Deep roots, especially if spring planted, start growth slowly. The trees usually sway in the wind until a funnel-shaped cavity is formed in the moist soil about the base of the trunk. Borers enter the trunk below ground more readily where such a cavity is formed than in shallow planted trees around which a dust mulch may be retained in close contact with the base of the trunk. Mice find shelter in the soil cavity about a deep-set tree and often girdle it. "Root rot" occurs much more frequently in trees set deep.

If trees are set in autumn they may be set an inch or so deeper than they stood in the nursery. The soil at this season is aired and warmed to a greater depth. New root growth starts in early winter on the lower roots which become established for early spring growth. If trees are transplanted in spring they should be set no deeper than they stood in the nursery. If the soil is heavy, spring-set trees should stand a little shallower than they stood in the nursery. In the case of spring-set trees, new root growth starts first on the roots nearest the surface of the soil, which is better aired and which warms up first.
