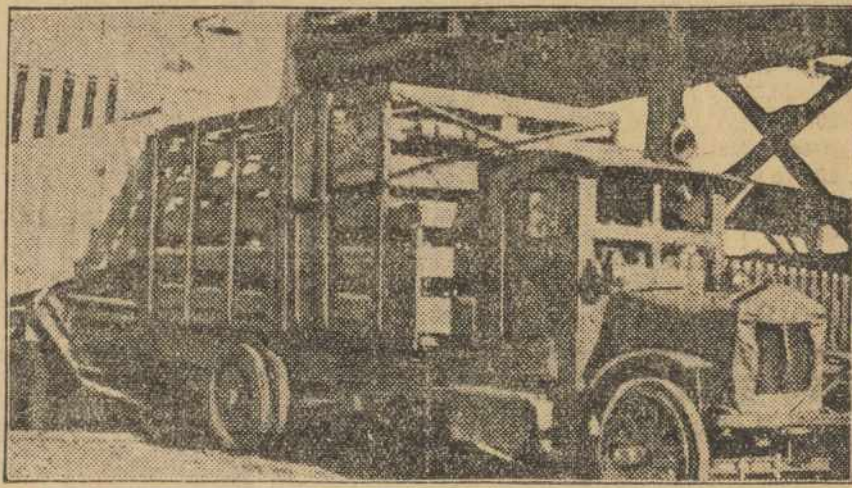

DOUBLE-DECKED TRUCKS FOR LIVE STOCK



Auto Truck Particularly Adapted for Hauling Hogs.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)
Use of double-decked auto trucks for hauling live stock is gaining in popularity in the Omaha Union stock yards, according to reports to the United States department of agriculture. Specially constructed trucks have increased greatly during the current summer, as the farmers in this way are able almost to double the tonnage they formerly could haul to market. Trucks of this type are being used extensively in the transportation of feeder sheep from the market to the grazing districts.
