ARTESIAN FLOW STRUCK BY CITY AT 200 FEET

At a depth of about 210 feet an artesian flow of about 3000 per hour was struck at the city well last week just by the pumping station. The water gushes from the 8 inch pipe in a steady flow. It has not been determined how high the water rises, but it rises high enough to flow into the present wells (reservoirs) from which the water is pumped to the tank.

The tank holds but 20,000 gallons, hence the flow of the new well will fill it 3 1/2 times each day. The new well seems to have no effect on the present supply.

The water from the deep well has a different taste from that of the old wells which are supplied from springs, but is apparently good water.

The new well cost \$6 per foot to drill or about \$1260. Artesian wells with such a generous flow are not common in the Willamette Valley. The effort to get water here by drilling deep several years ago was a failure, the city spending over \$2500 in sinking a well at the city jail to the depth of 500 feet. Peter Hornig, who drilled the new well, states that such wells usually supply a generous flow for many years, though they sometimes fail to flow after 15 or 20 years, and have to be drilled farther to renew the artesian flow, or the water has to be pumped as in an ordinary well.
