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Plane Smashed At Fair Ralph Leabo A Passenger

Ralph Leabo had an airplane experience last week Wednesday at the state fair which he does not care to repeat. While a passenger in a plane piloted by Pilot Turner, the plane fell and was damaged so badly that it is a wreck. Neither Turner nor his passenger were injured much, though Mr. Leabo received a hard blow on the head when the wings of the plane broke into, as the machine struck the ground.

It is said that Turner was flying rather low at the time and that he slowed up his motor, seeing too late that he could not keep the plane in the air. As the plane fell it came near plunging into a group of parked automobiles, missing them by less than four feet.

Old Beck Farm Sold To Californian

The old home farm of Chas. Becke was sold last week to Wm. Jeskey, of Auburn, California. There are 150 acres and a roomy house. The price paid was \$24,000. The purchaser will return to California for the winter, but will take possession in the spring. Kenneth Knapp and J. S. Friend, two 13 year old boys of Portland, who passed through here last week, going south, have not yet been located, though the Salem police and the county officers have been on the lookout for them.

One of the boys was riding a bicycle and the other was riding in a small express wagon trailing behind the bicycle. One of the boys wore glasses and both were "light complexioned", according to the meagre description given by their parents. They talked with several persons here, asking the distance to Salem, and saying they could make it in 4 hours.

Heaviest Crop of Baby Hops In Oregon

The 1920 John Pugh hop crop, contracted by Henry L. Bents for Straus & Co. of London, was taken in yesterday by Mr. Bents. On 13 1/2 acres 15,397 pounds were produced. The 1920 contract price is 43 cents making the crop worth \$6620.71. Mr. Pugh has found that this year's crop cost him 16 cents a pound in the bale. Thus the crop nets him over \$4100 above all expenses, or more than \$300 per acre, net.

As this is the first year's crop, next year the crop should be almost twice as heavy, under normal conditions. Next year's contract price is 33 cents, and the 1922 price is 29 cents.

So far as reported the Pugh yard has the heaviest crop of baby hops in the state.

Judge Bingham Advises New Citizens

When a class of 12 applicants appeared before Judge Bingham at Salem last week, petitioning for citizenship, he said to them:

"The sacred right of freedom of thought and free speech is to be highly respected and treasured. It reserves to all citizens the right to make constructive criticism and the right and duty if inaugurating beneficial laws and needed changes.

"Those who would tamper with this right and who attempt to undermine this government with vicious and destructive propaganda must be met with distrust and dealt with in a firm way."

"The constitution of the United States, in granting freedom of speech and of the press, does not license anyone to undermine the law or to violate statutes."

Overseas Veteran Returns

Frank Gloss, Jr., an overseas veteran of 22, surprised his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Gloss, last week by coming on a visit from Camp Lewis, where he is now stationed. He went to France with the Ninth Infantry, just after General Pershing.

He was engaged in the fierce combats about Verdun, his company of 267 men at one time having only 7 men fit for duty—the others having been killed, wounded or sick. He was wounded and taken to a French hospital and for 4 months was reported as "missing in action."

Mr. Gloss' present visit is the first since he returned from France.

Pioneer Colonist Passes On To Reward

George Ziegler died at his home near Barlow Friday evening, October 1, at the age of 77 years. Burial took place Sunday at the Aurora Presbyterian church, the funeral services being conducted by Rev. Long of Woodburn.

He leaves to mourn his loss a daughter Mrs. R. W. Zimmerman; two sons Chris F. Ziegler and Henry G. Ziegler; and six sisters Mrs. Tilda Shadle, Mrs. Mena Erich, Mrs. Mary Steinbach, Mrs. Sophia Hoffman, Mrs. Christina Smith and Miss Julia Ziegler; eleven grand children and one great grand child, and numerous other relatives.

Grandpa Ziegler, as he was familiarly known, was the seventh of a family of twelve to pass to the great beyond. He was born in Pittsburg, Pa., July 5, 1843. He moved to Bethel, Mo. with his parents, when a child. At the age of 19 he joined the westward bound emigrant train, reaching Aurora in 1863, near which place he has since resided. He was a member of the Aurora Colony. In 1867 he was married to Miss Elizabeth Will.

George Ziegler was a man thoroughly respected by a large circle of friends, as a man of integrity and sterling citizenship.

Parties in Auto Accident Well Known Here

Mrs. Richard Everding, 241 Eleventh street, Portland, who is well known here, was injured Saturday night in a collision between an automobile driven by her son, Henry Everding, and another machine at Eighteenth and Washington streets. Mr. Everding, who was driving, was bruised and shaken up. The machine with which they collided is alleged to have cut the corner on turning into Eighteenth street. The driver went on without stopping to see what damage he had done. Mrs. Everding's injuries were not considered serious. Mrs. Everding is a sister of W. R. Scheurer of Butteville, and often visits Aurora.

Donald Man Dies While On Hunting Trip

Chris P. Christensen, of Donald died Monday, October 4, at Johnson Creek, Rangers Station, Douglas county of heart trouble, while on a hunting trip with a party of friends from Donald. The body was taken to Roseburg and brought to Aurora Tuesday. The funeral services were held at the Masonic Hall in Donald yesterday afternoon with the Masonic burial rites, and interment took place at the Butteville cemetery.

Mr. Christensen was a native of Denmark. He was unmarried and was 63 years of age. He belonged to the Masonic order. He was employed for some time by J. P. Feller of Donald, and was liked and respected by all who knew him.

Eby Wants New Charter

O. D. Eby, Oregon City attorney, has declined to be a candidate for mayor of that city. He is now a councilman. He declares that the Oregon City plan of government is faulty, and believes the charter should be amended to provide for a mayor and two councilmen, who should have the power to appoint a paid manager, recorder, attorney, superintendent of water works, street superintendent and other necessary officers.

Growers Sell Hops

T. A. Livesley & Co. have purchased the Fred Bents lot of hops at Fargo, at 35 cents.

J. P. Freeman has sold his 1920 hop crop of 48 bales at a price around 35 cents to T. A. Livesley & Co. Mr. Freeman baled early and sold as soon as possible.

The hop yard on the Geo. W. Yergen place this year yielded an average of about 1900 pounds per acre. The hops were of fine quality. This is the "Joe Gee" yard, belonging to the chinaman who was run down not long ago by an automobile in Portland.

News from Eugene says that T. A. Livesley & Co. have recently purchased 1500 bales of Lane county hops at 50 to 60 cents. Frank Heyer, Livesley's Eugene agent stated, however, that he could not pay that figure this week due to the slump in hop prices.

Mayor Urges Care Against Fire

Mayor Ehlen calls attention to Saturday October 9, as Fire Prevention Day, and requests all citizens of Aurora to observe that day in an inspection of their premises for fire hazards, and urges every person to make a firm resolution to not relax their vigilance against danger from fire during the coming year.

The Hop Market

(Oregonian, October 2)

The hop market has gone off another 5 cents this week and now stands at 40-cent level for the new crop.

As a result of the decline, more business has developed. Whereas it was a one man market at the opening of the season, there are several buyers now in the field, and while the market is by no means active, it is showing much more life than heretofore.

In the past two days, 300 or 400 bales were bought from growers at 40 cents and it is reported that two or three lots were also obtained at 39 cents. There was buying in the Gaston and Sherwood sections. So far as could be learned, most of the purchasing was to fill shortages on contracts.

Farmers are offering their crops rather freely in view of the declining tendency of the market. It remains to be seen whether enough support will be forthcoming from the buying element to check the decline.
