MOST VALUABLE SHEEP FEED

Rye Stands at Head of Cereals in Protein Content, but Lacking in Carbohydrates.

Whether fed as a grain ration, pastured, or cut and fed for hay, rye holds a high place for feeding pregnant ewes at weaning time.

This suggests two things in regard to its feeding value: First, to feed in combination with other things lacking in protein but rich in fat-forming elements, like corn and wheat.

Hop Industry Dead In Austria

A letter from Franz Kraxberger in Austria to Henry L. Bents of this city states that no person who has not seen it can comprehend how that nation is suffering.

"The hop growing industry," writes Mr. Kraxberger, "has almost completely disappeared—not to come back for years. Three per cent beer is now used in Austria, and after October 1, 8-per cent beer will be allowed in the market."

"Hops are mixed with tobacco, not only the cut tobacco, but all forms used in Austria. In normal times an American dollar equals 5 kronen in value, but today the following are examples of the prices that prevail here:

Butter is 40 kronen per pound, meat 30 to 120 kronen per pound, wood 1000 kronen per cord, shoes 2000 kronen per pair, flour 20 kronen per pound (or 1000 kronen per sack), suit of clothes 5000 kronen."

Mr. Kraxberger wrote from Axberg, Post Thening Ober Oesterreich, Austria, where he was visiting relatives.

DIVIDED PASTURES FOR HOGS

Animals Thrive Much Better on Young Tender Shoots Than on Old Hardened Stalks.

It has been found repeatedly that hogs will do better on the young tender shoots than on the old hardened stalks. For that reason it is advisable to divide the pastures so that the hogs can be shifted from one to the other at intervals of a week or ten days.

SHEEP BUSINESS PROFITABLE

Study Being Made of Specialized Raising With Complete Reliance on Forage Crops.

Results of a farm sheep experiment reported by the United States department of agriculture show clearly the possibility of a profitable sheep-raising business upon eastern lands. At the government farm, Beltsville, Md., a study is being made of specialized intensive sheep raising with complete reliance upon forage crops for summer pasturage.

In 1916 a 30-acre area did not produce forage enough to feed satisfactorily 44 Southdown ewes and 33 lambs. This field is now capable of furnishing sufficient summer feed for 100 ewes with their lambs. The improvement is due in part to the application of manures, lime, and phosphates, but chiefly to the fact that leguminous crops were largely used and all crops were fed upon the ground. Under the system followed forage crops are seeded in rotation and the sheep are allowed such frequent changes of pasture as are necessary to prevent troubles from parasites.
