One of the Best Ways Is Use of Stubble Fields After Grain Has Been Cut in Autumn.

One of the cheapest ways of producing pork is the use of the stubble fields after the grain has been cut in the fall. In spite of all that can be done there is more or less grain scattered on the ground during the process of cutting and stacking. Hogs w!ll pick this up and produce excellent cains without any additional grain.

Animals Thrive Much Better on Young Tender Shoots Than on Old Hardened Stalks.

It has been found repeatedly that hogs will do better on the young ten ter shoots than on the old hardened starks. For that reason it is advisable o divide the pastures so that the hogs an he shifted from one to the other at intervals of a week or ten days.


