SMALL FRUITS vs HOPS

The belief is growing that small fruits are the coming crop in the Willamette Valley. C. A. McLaughlin, one of the largest hop growers in the state, is quoted as saying:

"It is going to be the industry of this country, and much better than hops. At least a grower will not have to worry his head off about the crop." This is the sentiment of farmers in Independence, and if a reliable market can be obtained here, it is said, a number of hop growers will abandon the hop industry and follow the cultivation of small fruits.

COURT PREPARES BUDGET

The county court has turned down the request of various interests in the county for appropriations. According to reports from Salem, there will be no bee commissioner, no county nurse, no county agent, no county library, no \$10,000 for to help build an armory at Silverton. The court gave as its reasons, inability to include provisions for these matters without exceeding the 6 per cent limitation. The levies requested but eliminated from the budget may be submitted to the people later.

The budget prepared Saturday provides about \$39,000 less for roads and bridges than last year. But the taxpayers of the county will have to dig down in their jeans for a cool million in taxes in 1921. The chief funds are estimated as follows:

PHONOGRAPHS

Plans have been put under way to double the capacity of the factory of the Stradivara Phonograph company at East Thirty-third street and Broadway and to make the Stradivara phonograph a national competitor with other leading phonographs manufactured in the United States, according to an announcement made yesterday by J. T. Thompson, general manager of the concern.

The new programme provides for the development of an export department and the manufacture of an exclusive line of machines for export. This increased capacity proposed for the corporation will make the phonograph industry one of the leading ones in the state, which will employ a large number of skilled workmen Mr. Thompson declared.

The Stradivara Phonograph company was organized several months ago as a \$5,000,000 corporation, and in August of this year it absorbed by purchase the factory and other assets of the Pacific Phonograph manufacturing company.

The concern recently established a branch house in San Francisco. From this house will be handled the territory of California, Arizona and Nevada. Additional branch houses will be established as fast as the capacity of the plant will permit, it was announced.—Oregonian.

TAX ON "OUTLANDERS"

Owing to happenings that came under the observation of the Woodburn city marshal—an episode that cannot be printed—the city council of that place has passed an ordinance that outsiders ("outlanders" in the phrase of the Boers) who give dances in Woodburn must first pay \$20 for a city license. The council hopes this action will confine the management of dances to local people, with a corresponding improvement in the conduct of some who attend.

PIONEER PASTOR DEAD

The funeral of the veteran Methodist pastor, Rev. A. J. Joslyn, of Canby, took place there Saturday, December 11. His death resulted from the explosion of coal oil, while he was cleaning a clock.

Dr. Joslyn was born in Indiana in 1843, and came to Oregon with his parents in 1850.

Rev. Joslyn had occupied some of the first pulpits of his church in the Pacific Coast country, from near Salt Lake to the sundown sea, and at Nome, Alaska. He was also district superintendent at one time of one of the most important districts of the North Pacific coast.

Mr. and Mrs. Roy White are now living in Salem, where he is working for the street railway company. He has been there since September.
