BLUE LAW PROPOSED

The Woodburn city council last week received a petition signed by 271 people, some of whom are said to have been non-residents, asking the council to pass an ordinance forbidding Sunday movies. It was explained by the petitioners that the movement had been started by the Y. M. C. A. following the lead of other Oregon towns.

The council finally decided to postpone action, with the understanding that a special election be called to decide the matter. The election will doubtless be a warm one—as all Sunday closing elections usually are.

If the county agent and county club leader hold their positions for next year, it will be up to the taxpayers to retain them by voting at the budget meeting to be held in the courthouse on the 28th of this month.
