TELEPHONE MEETING

The annual telephone meeting of the local company was held here Saturday. The out-going directors were re-elected. The matter of raising the rates were discussed and the stockholders present were satisfied that there is little else to be done—if service is to be continued.

It was shown that everything the company buys has increased from 100 to 250 per cent during the last five years, with no prospect of lower prices for telephone supplies and repairs.

The rate has been the same all that time, with an increasing deficit the past two years. Hence, it was the sentiment of the stockholders present that no other course is open.

KEEPING HOGS IN CONDITION

Mixture of Charcoal, Salt, Air-Slaked Lime, Wood Ashes and Copperas Is Favored.

For hogs running out the following preparation helps to keep them in good condition: Take of charcoal three bushels; of salt eight pounds; of air-slaked lime two quarts; of wood ashes one bushel; dissolve one pound of copperas in hot water, sprinkle with the solution the mixture of the other things; mix all up thoroughly and put the mixture in the feed boxes and set them where the hogs will have free access to them. Every farmer should have self-feeding boxes or racks, so that the stock can only get the needed supply and not waste it nor get too heavy a supply at one time.

Improvement Can Be More Quickly Brought About by Use of More Registered Sires.

The more general use of good purebred sires is strongly advocated as the foundation stone to live stock improvement on account of the fact that improvement can be more quickly and economically brought about in the herds of the country by the use of better sires than in any other way.

ECONOMIZE IN FEEDING HOGS

Where Abundance of Grain Is Furnished Animals Will Not Eat as Much on Pasture.

Where too much grain is fed the hogs satisfy their appetites on grain and will not eat as much pasture as they should. For that reason under present conditions, when grain prices are high and pork prices comparatively low, it is advisable to limit the grain ration to two pounds or less.

DAIRY HINTS

CAMPAIGN FOR BETTER SIRES

Owners of Purebred Animals Take Generous Pride in Progress of the Movement.

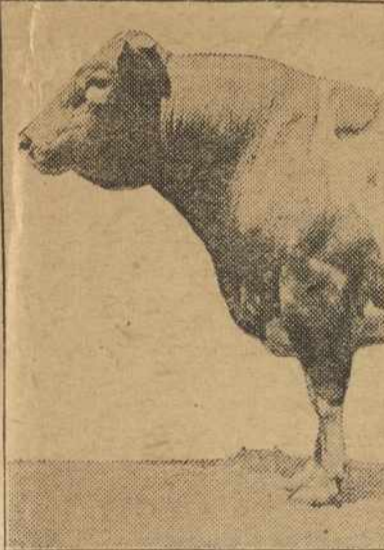
Every mail received by the bureau of animal industry, United States department of agriculture, shows the readiness with which farmers and animal breeders in general are co-operating in carrying out the "Better Sires—Better Stock" campaign.

The letters show that the owners of purebred sires take a generous and proper pride in the progress of the campaign in their community. One letter recently received contained the following advertisement clipped from a county newspaper published in Pennsylvania:

"Don't breed to scrubs—fetch your big cows to Victory farms—service free.

"For milk: Breed to De Kol Pietje Charles Dickens. Sire: Woodcrest Urna Pietje. Dam: Daisy Le Polke De Kol III (Holstein-Friesian).

"For beef: Breed to Cardington Bob Bin Sykes. Sire: Cardington

Blackjack. Dam: Jennie of Olenyany (Aberdeen-Angus).

"Will pay \$25 for five-day-old heifer calves bred by either one of these sires when delivered at Victory farms.

"Owner."

The owner of this farm explains by letter that he also maintains purebred boars and that the service of these animals is free to neighboring farms. This is but one instance in which the owner of better sires has offered their advantages to his neighbors free of charge. The fact that the owner of the sires is willing to buy the heifer calves bred from his purebred bulls is an indication of the increased profits that may be realized by the owner of a scrub or grade herd when he has put a purebred sire at its head. It shows that the value of the progeny of a purebred sire and a grade dam is so well established in the minds of the best informed among breeders that they are willing to pay a much higher rate for this progeny than for a calf with grade parents in both the sire and the dam. It further illustrates the rapidity of improvement in a herd which has a purebred sire at its head.
