FORMER MEMBER OF "ROUGH RIDERS" HAS OIL CLAIM IN WILHOIT

An oil and mineral lease covering 390 acres of land, located in section 32, township 6 south, range 2 east, was filed with the Clackamas county recorder one day last week.

The property is located on the Marion county line between Scotts Mills and Wilhoit Springs and is owned by John Grossen of Scotts Mills, and is leased to John E. Hagerty of Portland.

Mr. Hagerty was a member of Roosevelt's "Rough Riders" and saw service with the former president in Cuba. Two of his sons enlisted in the World war and were interred in France. Mrs. Chas. O. Thomas and children have returned from their vacation trip to the coast.

Farming Districts of Oregon
