A FEW FACTS ABOUT CANBY

Canby is an old town. The first store in this town was started by Albert H. Lee, father of M. J. Lee. The location was where Yoder Bros. confectionery is now, and in the same old building. A good share of the homes of the east part of town are located on ground formerly owned by Mr. Lee.

People not acquainted with Canby history, look upon the little chicken coops of Mr. Lee in the east part of town between the highway and the S. P. tracks as the property of a poor old man trying to get a start in chickens to help make a living. The fact is, Mr. Lee has title to this little strip of land and takes pleasure in maintaining this small chicken ranch and feeding his Rhode Island Reds. Haman A. Lee was the first mayor of Canby.

William Knight was one of the first incorporators of this town. He was city recorder for the first few years. He has been a resident here for 53 years, right on the same tract of land where his fine big house now stands. Mr. Knight was sheriff of Clackamas county from 1884 to 1888. He was school clerk for 40 years. He is justice of the peace now and has been for about 41 years. He helped plant the maple and silver leaf maples which now furnish the shade for Canby's streets. This was done in 1870 and these trees are what helps to make Canby a beautiful little city.

The first town well was dug where the municipal drinking fountain now is located, close to J. W. Snider's "shoe hospital." This well was dug in 1868.

Canby has nearly 1,100 inhabitants. It is an ideal place for homes, and very citizen of this little city is of the home-loving kind. It is just 25 miles from Portland and 31 miles from Salem, the state capital. It is 1/2 miles from the Willamette river. All the leading lodges are represented here, including I. O. O. F., and the Masons. Canby has several Protestant churches and a Catholic church. Few small cities command more business than does Canby.

The graded schools and High school are a pride to the city.

The town was named for Edward R. S. Sanby, who served in the Florida, Mexican and civil wars.

In our last week's issue we made an error when we stated that the cost of paving of Canby's streets was \$1,400. The fact is it cost forty-five thousand dollars.
