### CONSIDER THE RAILROAD

Willis H. Jenkins, from the Traffic department of the Southern Pacific Co., was a caller last week. We questioned Mr. Jenkins regarding railroad rates, labor, freight and possible extensions. The S. P. company paid in Marion county in 1920, \$117,923.20 in taxes. In Oregon in 1920 the S. P. paid us for taxes \$1,110,038.86. Still people insist in patronizing the heavy trucks that pay our county no tax and ruin our highways that are so expensive to keep up. One argument is sure: if the railroad's were never built there would be mighty few conveniences in Oregon; and many towns that the railroads keep up would be wiped off the map if the tracks were torn up.

If remarks, street talk and comments at random are indications of public opinion, Oregon people are in favor of the 1925 Fair at least ten to one. That proportion tell us that they expect to realize a great deal more out of it than they put in.

Loganberry growers should put the canes upon the trellises before the winter rainy season if tip dieback is to be prevented. Although a very severe winter might injure the canes to some extent, investigation conducted this year by the O. A. C. experiment station show that the yearly loss due to dieback exceeds in importance the possibility of another exceptional winter. As soon as tied up they should be sprayed with bordeaux 4-4-50 to protect against fungi, especially the bases of the canes.—Botany and Plant Pathology.

At Aurora Band Hall Friday night Oct. 21, the Elite Orchestra and Singers will give a dance and "night of fun and frolic."

Beekeepers of the Willamette valley have sustained heavy losses this season due to the ravages of European foul brood. Some complaints have come to the O. A. C. experiment station concerning the wax moth, but these insects merely enter the hives and clean up the havoc wrought by the brood.—Entomology.
