Bernieta Everhart who is in the Good Samaritan hospital for appendicitis, is improving rapidly.

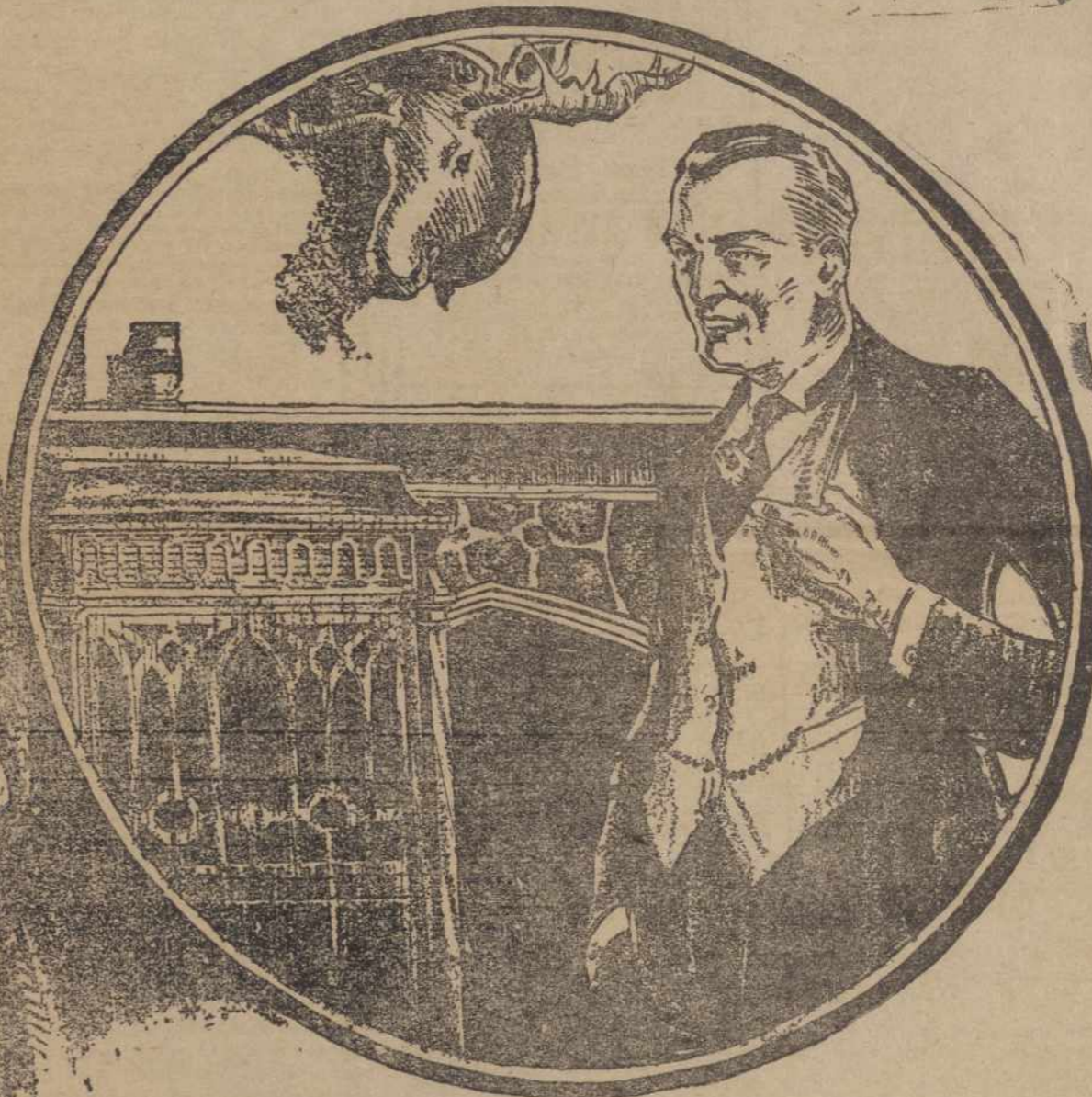
