When asked for a statement with respect to Mr. Gray's message Mr. Spencer said:

The entry of the Union Pacific into the Willamette Valley and Western Oregon would afford transportation service from this section to the heart of commercial activity of the country by the shortest and most direct route possible. It is inconceivable that the Union Pacific would desire to enter this Western Oregon section if it did not conceive resulting development and advantage to both the country and the railroad. The rebuilding of the Southern Pacific main line from Portland south to the state line, the construction of the Beaverton cut-off and bridge across the Willamette, the acquisition and reconstruction of the Corvallis & Eastern line, the acquisition of the Salem-Falls City line, the construction of the line to Tillamook, the acquisition and construction of the line between Natron and Weed by way of Klamath Falls and of the line from Eugene to Marshfield were all conceived and prosecuted during the control by the Union Pacific of the Southern Pacific, and the development thus accomplished during the Union Pacific administration from 1901 to 1913 should be sufficient assurance of the attitude of the Union Pacific with respect to the territory involved.

Paul Robinson of the Aurora Observer, will about the tenth of July begin publishing the Vernonia Eagle. Vernonia is a new-old town just coming into its own through the lumber industry, located some miles north of Banks, where Mr. Robinson was for several years publishing the Banks Herald. It is understood Mr. Robinson will conduct both papers.—Hubbard Enterprise
