COMBATING CHINCH BUGS SHOWN IN WINDOW DISPLAY

In Morgan County, Ind., the agricultural agent demonstrated by a window display the method of combating chinch bugs. A box 3 feet long, 2 feet wide, and 2 inches deep was filled with sand, some small corn plants being set out at one end and some wheat stubble and timothy at the other. A coal-tar barrier was placed around the edges of the box and chinch bugs were placed in the wheat stubble. Part of the corn patch was protected by a coal-tar barrier.

The exhibit was set up on Thursday and displayed until Saturday night. The barrier line was renewed twice a day. By Saturday morning the corn that the chinch bugs had been allowed to reach was completely wilted, while the protected corn was still in perfect condition. Through this display several thousand people were shown what chinch bugs are and how they affect corn. Two other exhibits of this kind were put up in different sections of the county.

COLORADO POTATO BEETLE NOW MENACING FRANCE

Although plagues of insects that attack our crops become gradually less destructive, through adaption of control measures and the development of a liking for the pests by native insect or bird enemies, they still exact a huge tribute each year from the farmer.

A case in point is the Colorado potato beetle, which in its eastward march 50 years ago threatened to wipe out the important potato crop. Its distribution toward the South and West and has been less rapid than that directly eastward, and it is well controlled by natural enemies and the use of insecticides. The amount annually expended for arsenical poisons and their application against this pest probably reaches \$20,000,000.

Although the control of this pest is now well understood by American potato growers, its recent appearance in France in the vicinity of Bordeaux is causing much alarm to French farmers and entomologists. It has apparently already spread there beyond the possibility of extermination and the authorities have been obliged to take up the question of legal action to enforce spraying with arsenicals. The situation is regarded as so serious that the establishment of zones in which no potatoes can be grown is being considered.

WATER PROJECT STARTED

Molalla, Ore., Aug. 18.—Percy A. Cupper, state engineer, will be one of the speakers at the Lyric theater Tuesday evening, August 29. Professor Powers of Oregon Agricultural college, soil expert, also is expected to speak. This meeting has been called to form an irrigation district.

A temporary organization organization, with L. A. Shaver as president and Oliver Buxton as secretary, has been working on this plan for the last two weeks. Water rights from Molalla river have been filed upon. A survey of the proposed ditch has been made. The proposed system is practical, inexpensive and requires less than five miles of open canal to divert water from the Molalla river to the head of the valley. About 10,000 acres are in the district.—The Oregonian

Scrubs Bring 30 Years of Regret

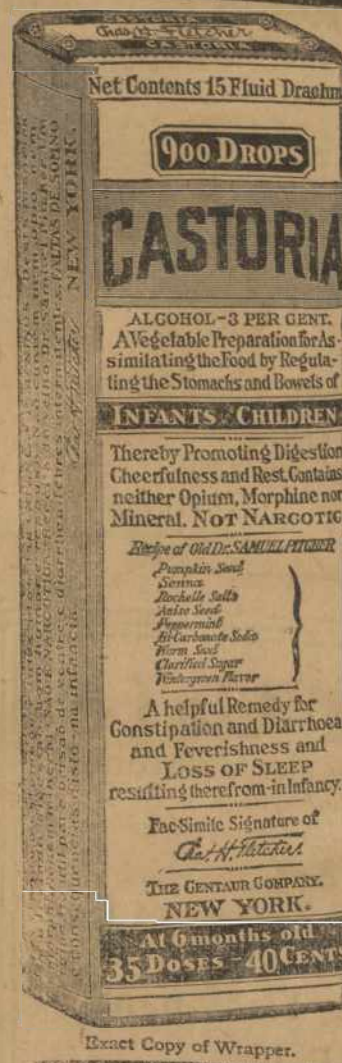
