EDITORIAL Opinions of the Observer.

We deplore the introduction of a religious controversy in the present campaign. The real question politically is the economic one, the question of taxes.

The compulsory school question comes before us directly and should be tried by the voters directly and solely upon its merits.

The tax question is presented only in an indirect manner and can be reached only through political channels. It really matters little whether Mr. Olcott or Mr. Pierce themselves believe in compelling public school attendance. We, the people, must decide that question.

But we must judge which of the candidates will accomplish the most good in the way of reducing the tax burdens. We do not believe Mr. Pierce's record while in the senate justifies a belief that he will be the right man.

The Oregon City Woolen Mill is starting a nation-wide advertising campaign for the marketing of its products, and is offering prizes to the stores handling its goods for the best advertisements and the best window displays. Referring to this campaign, the Silverton Tribune says:

"The Oregon City woolen mill is blazing the way for a great woolen industry in the West in its national advertising of a finished product produced from pure virgin wool, woven where the wool is grown and the success of its undertaking is of very direct interest to every sheep grower in the West."

Something to Think About

Asotin county in southeast corner of state of Washington, has a tax levy for all purposes amounting to \$259,886.76. The wheat yield, the county's only grain crop, is estimated at 250,000 bushels. At 90 cents a bushel, a little better than present market price, county's income from wheat will be around \$225,000.

Wheat represents about 80% of Asotin county's total agricultural and horticultural resources. The county will therefore have to produce about \$35,000 more than received from the wheat crop in order to meet tax payments, according to the secretary of the Asotin County Taxpayers' Association.

"Our farmers," says the secretary, "can no longer boast of being freeholders; they are mere tenants of the state and county."—Industrial News Bureau.

SPRAINS MAY BE SERIOUS

Should Never Be Taken Lightly, but Have the Most Careful Attention at Once.

Sprains and strains as a class are injuries which cause little concern and, consequently, to which little attention is paid. The result is, according to the medical correspondent of the London Times, that a great deal of disability is caused which need not have occurred at all. He tells how to avoid much of this and gives explanations which rob sprains of some of their mystery.

Sprains are not by any means so trivial as they are usually supposed to be. Some of them are not "sprains" at all, but slight dislocations, and it is by knowledge of this fact that so-called bloodless surgeons acquire their reputation. A return of the members to their correct position often ends the pain and discomfort of these accidents.

Again, some sprains are fractures. The bones may not have been separated, and so the fact that a break has occurred is overlooked. Not until permanent damage has been done is professional help called in.

Finally, there are cases in which fibers of ligaments—i. e., the binding material forming the hinges of a joint or the means of fixation of a muscletendon to a bone—have been torn asunder. These cases may prove exceedingly troublesome, and if not attended to may result in permanent weakness.

It is a good and safe rule to call in a doctor, says the writer, when any severe or even moderately severe sprain has been encountered. By this means the calamities attending neglect of serious injury are avoided.

Good Qualities of Wood.

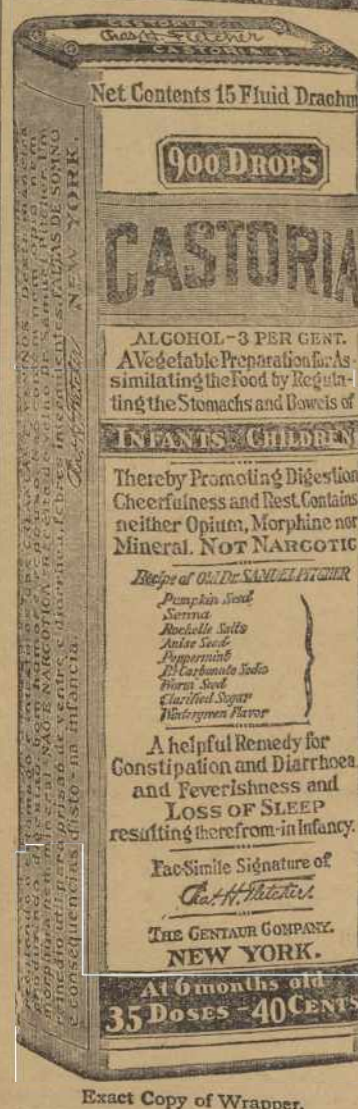
PROMINENT PORTLAND EDUCATOR IS HONORED

At a recent meeting of representatives of several non-sectarian and Protestant private schools held in Portland, Joseph A. Hill, president of Hill Military Academy, was elected executive secretary of a permanent organization formed on that occasion. Mr. Hill, in addressing the delegates, said: "Our private schools are endangered by the measure known as the 'compulsory educational bill,' which will come before the voters this November. We have given our best thought and effort and years of untiring devotion to the cause of education and now all our work would be swept away in the flood that is directed at the private schools.

"Oregon already has a compulsory educational law. Why should this new measure be necessary? Private schools such as the Hill Military academy and others on the list of those to be affected use practically the same books and courses of study as do public schools. But we have smaller classes and can give more individual attention to the pupils. To do away with our schools would be to increase the taxpayers' burdens materially for it would take millions of dollars to build extra public schools, equip them and provide them with teachers. In addition it would destroy the means of living of hundreds of our teachers and employees. We teach Americanism most loyally and our patriotic exercises daily inspire our pupils with pride in their country and a respect
